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RECEIPTS FROM RENT OF FOREST RESERVES

SCHOOL AND ROAD FUNDS OF OREGON COUNTIES PROFIT

Crook County Has Forest Area of 1,358,889 Acres and Receives the Sum of \$4,745.04

Oregon's share from the rental and sale of forest reserve lands within its borders this year totals \$55,950.72, according to a statement prepared by Secretary of State Olcott. Under the federal law the state is entitled to 25 per cent of the money derived by the government from the rental and sale of its forest reserve lands, and the statement, in addition to showing the total, shows the amount each county will receive. The money is divided equally between the school and road funds. The forest reserves in Oregon cover 16,023,220 acres. The apportionment went to the counties as follows:

ated on any land that "now" had an existing water right, and the question was as to how this word should be construed. Decision was finally reached that the word had reference to the time when the act became effective. This will increase the lien on the lands which have no existing water rights about \$1.03 an acre, or about \$18,000 for the whole project.
