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**CROOK COUNTY GOOD ROADS**  
 The Portland Journal has the following editorial on good roads in Crook county:  
 The voters of Crook county on Tuesday rejected a proposition to bond the county for roads. Their decision does not indicate that they are opposed to improved highways. It should not be so regarded. On the contrary it denotes that the majority of the voters of that county desire to proceed intelligently and determine first where the roads shall be made before voting the money for their construction.  
 The local conditions in the county are peculiar. There are rival communities and each thinks more of its personal interests than of the collective benefit. Naturally each thinks the money should be spent in its immediate vicinity. Every rancher thinks the road should be built around his barn for his individual accommodation.  
 It was in the midst of these contending forces without any definite plan that the question of a bond issue was submitted to the voters of the county. The proposition was properly rejected.  
 The people of Crook county are fully alive to the value and necessity of good roads and they will have them ultimately.  
 They realize that the first essential is to decide on a trunk road that will serve the interest of the entire county and then add feeders to it. They want good roads but they want them to be permanent and they want a dollar's worth of road for a dollar of money.

**A TON OF JACK RABBITS SHIPPED TO PORTLAND**  
 Madras Pioneer, Nov. 6: Monday night there was shipped out over the Oregon Trunk by express to Portland, over 2000 pounds of rabbits that were killed in the drive at Lamonta Sunday. These rabbits had been gathered up and cleaned properly for the Portland market. The returns from these rabbits will be used for the purchase of ammunition for the next hunt, it being the inten-

tion of the farmers in that locality to furnish as much free ammunition as possible for those who are not able to buy for themselves. The rabbits are sold in Portland in the different sections of the city to the cheaper restaurants.

**WANTS \$50,000 FOR THE LOSS OF AN ARM**

Prineville Journal: J. N. Linster has filed a suit in the district court against J. T. Adams and the City of Bend for \$50,000 damages for the loss of an arm.  
 On the 26th of last March Linster was operating a gasoline engine and air compressor used for the purpose of drilling rock for a sewer trench in the city of Bend.  
 It was necessary to oil the engine and air compressor at short intervals and while so doing he was struck by the crank shaft of the engine and knocked under the fly-wheel, where his right arm was cut off. The action is based on the claim that the machinery was not properly housed nor sufficiently safeguarded to protect the operator.

"The same condition is reported in portions of southwestern Washington where a local meat company is offering above the general basis in an effort to kill creameries of that section. It is stated that some of the creameries have three or four prices they are offering for butter fat, the height being dependent entirely upon the amount of competition in sight.  
 "On the other hand, the country creameries are getting quite well organized and say they intend to force the issue. Many of them have pooled their interests and are members of the Northwest Butter exchange of this city, which acts as selling agents.  
 "It is quite probable that the country interests will engage in the selling of cold storage and eastern butter and endeavor to beat the city creameries at their own game.  
 "In the meantime, the price of butter fat is about the most uncertain commodity on the market.  
 "It has been reported that some of the creameries have been wrapping eastern and Australian butter as well as country creamery under city creamery wrappers and an effort will be made to stop this practice."

**WILL BUILD A CONCRETE PUMPING STATION SOON**

The Prineville Journal says that the Deschutes Power Co. will begin the erection in a few days of a new concrete building to be used for a pump house. It will be erected to the north of the present power house and a new 800 gallon centrifugal fire pump and a 200 gallon Triplex Gould pump will replace the steam pumps now in use. The old pumps will not be dismantled, however, but will be kept ready for use in case of an emergency. It will take a 75-horse power direct connected motor to handle the 800 gallon fire pump and a 25-horse power for the 200 gallon. Work on the new building will be started within 10 days and the new pumps will be working by the first of the year. It was the intention of the Power Co. to install the pumps sooner but the machinery could not be obtained.
