CROOK COUNTY PASTURAGE FINE FOR IMPORTED CATTLE

It has been demonstrated that cattle in a poor condition, brought into this section of Central Oregon from southwestern points, have materially increased in weight on the pasturage they were put on in Crook county.

Tests by practical cattle men here show that the actual gain on cattle from the above points has been about 100 pounds per month, or three pounds per day, which goes to show that outside cattle brought in and put on the ranges here will take on weight in the same manner and in the same time and proportion as the native raised cattle.
