ATTEMPT TO ROB R. R. DEPOT
Robber Captured at Madras and Now
in County Jail

Madras Pioneer: Friday evening
of last week a transient by name of
Bert Welch thought that the Oregon
Trunk depot contained something that
would be of use to him, evidently
from the way he took of entering
the building.
The night operator had left the
place only a short time when Leslie
D. Cooper, who sleeps in the station,
heard a noise in the main office, the
intruder having stumbled over a
chair and awakened him. Mr. Cooper
immediately got up and dressed and
came around on the outside of the
depot and threw a flash light in-
to the office part, where Welch had
made his way by crawling through a
small window about 14 inches wide.
The intruder immediately feigned
drunkenness after being covered by
Mr. Cooper's gun. The latter how-
ever, was game and brought his man
down town where he was taken care
of for the balance of the night. The
next day a hearing was had before
Recorder Turner and Welch was taken
to Prineville to await the action of
the next grand jury which con-
venes in December.
