ELECTRIC LIGHT AT LAIDLAW
 May Have "Juice" at Town Near the Tumalo Project

DRUG STORES MUST SELL ONLY DRUGS ON SUNDAY

Drug stores and pharmacies where other than drugs are sold, are to be closed in Portland on Sunday hereafter, according to an announcement made by Mayor Albee recently. This means that all drug store proprietors must confine themselves to selling only drugs and medicine on the first day of the week. This is the start, it is stated, of a war between the proprietors of the various department stores throughout Portland and the owners of drug stores. It is contended by the department store owners that drug stores under the guise of drug stores, are selling merchandise Sunday when the department stores are closed. The owners also contend that it is discrimination when drug stores are allowed to keep open when they must keep their department stores closed.
