(Continued from 1st page) this unit of the project. State Treasurer Kay opposed any action that would commit the board to a plan for assuming the responsibility for the completion of this unit of the project. The matter is to be considered at a later meeting.

Mr. Kay said he did not believe the people of the state wanted to go into the irrigation business, that he opposed the appropriation for the Tumalo project and he would oppose taking up any other project. Olcott and Crawford expressed a doubt as to the advisability of the state taking hold of another project.

In the proposition submitted to the board, President Stanley of the company, states there are approximately 34,000 irrigable acres in the North Canal unit, to reclaim which he estimates would cost \$24 an acre.

ATTRACTIVE SHOW WINDOW

The Deschutes Power Co.'s office here has the most attractive show window in the city. Supt. James of the company, has made a display that outtops anything ever before seen in Redmond. It is a winter farm scene, with a large Christmas tree in the center. There is the log house and barn, the old fashioned rail fence, the windlass well with motor connection to draw the water, and an electric line running to the log house. The Christmas tree is lighted with miniature electric incandescent lights. Interspersed in among the branches of the tree are different electric devices that the company sells. A 4-square revolving advertising sign tells about the good quality of the electrical appliances that save time, labor and fuel. Supt. James evolved the decoration idea, and it is a good one.

\$140,000 EXPENDED ON BIG IRRIGATION PROJECT

Project Engineer Lauegaard has submitted a report to the State Desert Land Board showing that \$140,000 of the \$450,000 appropriated by the last Legislature to reclaim the lands in the Tumalo Project has been expended and that the work is progressing in a satisfactory manner. Since commencing work he has fed from 150 to 160 men, supplying in all 36,424 meals. The average cost per meal, including the cost of constructing and equipping the mess halls for the first few months was 24 cents. Last month the average cost was 21 cents.
