The loss is about \$12,000, only partly covered by insurance. The flames started from sparks from the stovepipe, falling on the roof of the creamery. The building, which housed both the factory and the creamery, was located too far from a hydrant to be reached with a stream of water, and was doomed from the start. A small stream would have saved it, as the fire burned slowly. Three carloads of barreled and bottled beer and 400 boxes of apples in cold storage were carried out and considerable machinery was also saved. The ice factory was the only one in Central Oregon and supplied Bend and other towns.

ANOTHER FIRE AT BEND

Ice and Cold Storage Plant There a Total Loss

A Bend dispatch of Dec. 19 says: Fire last night destroyed the plant of the Central Oregon Ice & Cold Storage Co., and the Pioneer Creamery.

The Giant Powder Co. and the Dupont Co. Representatives of these companies were in Laidlaw at the opening of the bids. The contract was awarded to the Trojan Powder Co. provided they can make the delivery in 11 days. In case they do not the contract goes to the Giant Co. The contract was for dynamite of 60, 40 and 20 per cent, also fuse and caps. The bid of the Trojan Co. was \$2,380.84, Giant \$5,399.32, Dupont \$2,412.50. Much of the dynamite will be sold to Contractor J. J. Adams for use in his work at the rock cut near Camp Three.
