ciently."

Speaking of the North Canal unit of the Central Oregon project, which covers about 32,000 acres, the governor said he was going to call a meeting of the settlers and submit to them a plan of state and federal cooperation for completing the project.

"After I submit the plan to the settlers," said the governor, "I'm going to ask the different commercial clubs in that section to consider the proposition. I will present it to the Irrigation Congress, which will meet in February, and will take it up with the reclamation service.

"After we have outlined a definite plan whereby the project can be handled in a business like manner, and not have the plans strangeld with red tape, it will be submitted to the secretary of the interior for his consideration. In doing this I will leave the state engineer to his usual cushion duties of making reports.

"When the people created the office of state engineer, they naturally expected they would get some one not afraid to get out on these projects, and get his feet muddy once in a while learning true conditions.

"When we provided for the completion of the Tumalo Project, owing to the fact that the state engineer lacked confidence in his ability to construct the works, we were obliged to provide for a project engineer, thus throwing additional burdens upon the state."

The governor's plan is one of education, as the proposition of state and federal co-operation will be submitted to the next legislature.
