D. 1846, at public outcry for cash on premises where Coon creek crosses the old Mission road, the following chattels, to-wit: 4 yoke of oxen with yokes and chains, 1 wagon with beds, 1 sledge wrenches, 4 sledge, 2 sledge boys, 2 prairie gloves 15 steel traps, 1 barrel of pickled cabbage, 1 hog-head of tobacco, 1 lot of sledge hoes, 1 spinning wheel, 1 loom, 12 tin bounds, a lot of oxen, mink and skunk skins and a lot of other articles. Am going to California. Richard Roe, owner. Few head cheese, apples and hard cider.

#### FOREST NOTES

There are 700 big-game or mountain sheep in the national forests of Nevada.

In 24 states there are state foresters who co-operate with private timberland owners in solving forest problems.

The forest service maintains nine experiment stations for studies in reforestation and similar subjects.

The Bureau of Entomology and the Forest Service, working together for the control of forest insects, last year covered more than 100,000 acres in their operations.

A national arboretum is being established in Rock Creek National Park, District of Columbia. Eventually it will contain all American tree species which will thrive there.

The total amount of land purchased in the eastern states for federal forests is nearly 400,000 acres. So far the principal work on these areas has involved their protection against forest fires.

#### NEW TAX LAWS

County Treasurer Jordan Gives Out Information

REVENUE OF NEW TAX LAW PROVISIONS (Section 3402 of Chap. 194, 1915 Session Laws)

The COUNTY TREASURER is made collector of all stamp duties imposed upon the State as before.

NO REBATE WILL BE PAID ON ANY TAXES. (Those per cent was formerly allowed if paid before March 1915.)

ALL TAXES are due and payable before April 1. They are not delinquent until September 1, but a penalty of one per cent per month is charged on all taxes paid after April 1 and before September 1. The first half may be paid before April 1, but a penalty of one per cent per month is charged on the remaining half if paid before September 1.

On all taxes unpaid on the first of September a penalty of ten per cent is imposed and one per cent per month interest is collected from that date.

On October 1 delinquent certificates, bearing interest at the rate of 15 per cent per annum, shall be issued.

The particular items in which the attention of taxpayers is called are these: The Treasurer instead of the Sheriff collects current taxes; a penalty of one per cent per month is charged on all taxes unpaid on April 1 and paid before September 1; a penalty of ten per cent is imposed on all unpaid taxes on September 1 and interest at the rate of one per cent per month is collected from that date.

The 1915 rolls will be in the hands of the Treasurer for collection about February 1, and current taxes can be paid any time between that date and April 1.
