Under These Permits 442,181 Acres Will Be Irrigated and Much Horsepower Generated

For the year 1913 a total of 466 permits were issued by the State Engineer for the appropriation water. Under these permits 442,-181 acres will be irrigated, 39,225 haorsepower will be developed and

41 reservoirs constructed at a total

cost of approximately \$7,000,000. During the quarter ending Dec 31, 1913, 88 permits were issued for the irrigation of 6,933 acres and the development of 1,956 horsepower Among these permits was one issued to F. D. Small of Tillamook, and D. Urie of Camas, Wn., for the de velopment of 1,208 horsepower with the waters of the Trask river in Till-


