PROCEEDINGS OF THE LAND BOARD

Official Report of Meeting Held at Salem on Monday, January 20th

WEST INTRODUCES TWO RESOLUTIONS

One Resolution Carries by Vote of 3 to 1 but Members "Crawfish" on Resolution for North Canal Proposition

The following is what happened at a meeting of the Desert Land Board held January 20, 1914:

All members being present but Secretary of State Olcott, who was out of the city attending a meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Oregon at Eugene.

The following resolution was introduced by Governor West:

Whereas, it appears that since the first segregation list was filed with the state under the Carey act in April, 1902, there have been filed from time to time about 30 similar segregation lists covering in the aggregate, in round numbers, 750,000 acres, and

Whereas, it appears that but two concerns have during the 14 years' time fully completed their projects, the same being:

Brownell Desert Reclamation Association, 240 acres.

Deschutes Reclamation & Irrigation Co., 1280 acres, making a total of 1520 acres.

Whereas, the Columbia Southern project went on the rocks and had to be taken over by the state in order to protect its good name, and,

Whereas, others are experiencing financial difficulties which can only lead to the state having to come to the rescue, and,

Whereas, as a rule the said Carey act projects in the state have not proven a success, and,

Whereas, the state is demonstrating upon the Tumalo project that these lands can be reclaimed by it in less time and at less cost than by private corporations, be it

Resolved, 1, that no further requests for temporary withdrawals be entertained or preliminary contracts be entered into.

2. That no further permanent contracts be entered into where preliminary contracts exist unless an iron clad guarantee is forthcoming that the lands will be speedily and fully reclaimed.

3. That no further extension of time be granted upon contracts unless it can be shown that work is being carried on in a faithful, business

like and satisfactory manner and assurance can be given that the work will be fully completed at an early date.

4. That all such projects should be handled only by the state or federal government.

Crawford moved to strike out the last two paragraphs but his motion failed.

The vote upon the resolution as introduced was as follows:

Ayes: West, Crawford, Lewis.

Noes: Kay.

Believing the board now committed to a policy of state or government reclamation the governor introduced the following resolution:

Whereas, it appears that the Central Oregon Irrigation Co. has declared its willingness to surrender a portion of its irrigation project to the state and federal government for completion, providing it be reimbursed for certain expenditures made upon said portions in order that said sum so received may be expended toward the completion of the balance of the segregation (excepting the Benham Falls-project) and,

Whereas, there is likelihood of the federal government co-operating with the state in this undertaking, and,

Whereas, the settlers upon said project and the residents of that section of the state are a unit in support of such a movement, be it

Resolved, that it is the sense of the Desert Land Board that if possible the said project should be reclaimed through state and federal co-operation, and to this end a careful investigation be made as to the expenditures of the company upon the unit it proposes to surrender, also as to the cost of its reclamation and such other information as the circumstances and the best interests of the public would demand.

The resolution failed to pass, the vote being as follows:

Aye: West.

Noes: Kay, Crawford, Lewis.

It will be seen that Lewis and Crawford supported the first resolution which was general in its terms and thus appeared to favor state and federal reclamation, and crawfished when a specific proposition was put to them.

Statement by Governor West

The action of the Desert Land Board will in no manner put a stop to our endeavors to bring relief to the settlers upon the C. O. I. Co. project through state and federal co-operation. The matter will be pushed vigorously by my office through different agencies, and I am confident that with the support of the settlers and business men of Crook county we will be successful.

PLENTY OF MOISTURE INSURES GOOD CROPS

GROUND IS WELL SOAKED SO FAR THIS SEASON

Snowfall and Rains Have Put the Soil in Crook County in Fine Condition

If the farmers in Central Oregon, in both the dry and irrigated sections, and especially in the former, do not get a bumper crop this year it will not be on account of lack of moisture in the ground. Though there has not been any extremely heavy snowfall at one time this season, enough snow and rains have fallen at different times so far as to put the ground in splendid condition. The ground has not been frozen at any time during these storms and the moisture has had a chance to go into the soil.

In the northern part of the county in the Culver, Metolius and Madras sections, where there is no irrigation this moisture will be especially beneficial, and an immense yield of oats and wheat is assured. This season's crop will make up for the short crop of last year, which was due to lack of moisture in the above sections.

Local Weather Observer T. G. Stevens reports that five inches of snow fell on the 17th, and 1.61 inches of rain fell on the 20th and 21st. About five inches of snow fell last Friday night and Saturday.

MANY WATER PERMITS ISSUED DURING 1913

THE TOTAL NUMBER AGGREGATED 466

Under These Permits 442,181 Acres Will Be Irrigated and Much Horsepower Generated

For the year 1913 a total of 466 permits were issued by the State Engineer for the appropriation of water. Under these permits 442,181 acres will be irrigated, 39,225 horsepower will be developed and 41 reservoirs constructed at a total cost of approximately \$7,000,000.

During the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1913, 88 permits were issued for the irrigation of 6,933 acres and the development of 1,954 horsepower. Among these permits was one issued to F. D. Small of Tillamook, and D. C. Urie of Camas, Wn., for the development of 1,208 horsepower with the waters of the Trask river in Tillamook county.

The following are the permits issued in Crook county the past quarter:

Edgar Laughlin of Paulina has two permits: one diverts the water from Mud springs in section 35, Tp. 16 S. R. 24 E for the irrigation of 20 acres, and the other diverts the water from Beaver Creek in Sec. 19, Tp. 16, S. R. 25 E. for the irrigation of 280 acres.

N. Logenbaugh of Prineville, diverts the flood waters in Sec. 15, Tp. 14 S. R. 15 E. for the irrigation of 95 acres.

Geo. B. Taylor of Prineville, has two permits: one for the irrigation of 5 acres with the waters diverted from two springs located in Tp. 18 S. R. 17 E., and the other for the irrigation of 100 acres with the waters of Little Bear Creek diverted in Section 23, Tp. 18 S. R. 17 E.

Chas. Cochran of Meadow, for domestic supply and the irrigation of 80 acres with the waters of Indian Creek, diverted in Sec. 31, Tp. 13 R. R. 21 E.

G. T. Hubbard of Grandview, for the irrigation of 10 acres with the waters of Metolius Creek, diverted in Sec. 34, Tp. 10 S. R. 10 E.

A. Brundage of Culver, for domestic supply, with the waters of Crooked River in Sec. 14, Tp. 12 S. R. 12 E.

A. E. McClellan of Shaniko, for the irrigation of 6 acres with the waters of a spring which is located in Sec. 11, Tp. 8 S. R. 14 E.

J. T. McClellan of Shaniko, for domestic use.

David Milburn of Lower Bridge, for the irrigation of 43 acres with the waters of Squaw Creek which is diverted in Sec. 6, Tp. 14 S. R. 12 E.

M. D. Nye of Roberts, for the irrigation of 8 acres with the waters of Little Bear Creek, diverted in Sec. 5 Tp. 18 S. R. 18 E.
