WORK ON TUMALO FOR ABOUT 100 MORE MEN

MAY RELIEVE THE UNEMPLOYED SITUATION

Desert Land Board Passes Upon Several Other Matters—Widow Get \$2500 Sum

The State Desert Land Board last week instructed O. Lauegaard, project engineer for the Tumalo Project to proceed with building a road around the project reservoir site, to build a drain from the upper part of the reservoir, to put the drops in the feed canals, and to construct the core wall of the reservoir dam up to 20 or 25 feet. This will give work to about 100 additional men, and will go that far in relieving the unemployed situation.

The board authorized the completion of units of the project covered by the old Columbia Southern canal as soon as 95 per cent of the land in the units was signed up by the settlers. This affects the settlers who were on the land when the state took over the project.

As recompense to the widow of the man who was killed by a falling derrick on the project, the board instructed Mr. Lauegaard to give her employment and decided to recommend that the Legislature authorize the board to pay her \$2500 out of the project funds. Mr. Lauegaard was instructed to take out liability insurance for his men until July 1, when the workmen's compensation law becomes effective.

He was authorized to purchase another automobile for use on the project, and his salary was increased from \$300 to \$350 a month.

A number of teachers write for exemptions at each examination, for, if they score the 90 mark, it is not necessary thereafter for them to be examined again in the subject covered by the examination. RESOLUTION

Be it resolved by the Common Council of the City of Redmond, Oregon:

That a sidewalk of the width of four feet be, and the same is hereby ordered to be laid in front of the following described premises, to-wit: Lots one to six, both inclusive, in block eight; lots one to six, both inclusive, in block thirteen; lots one to six, both inclusive, in block twenty-eight, facing and bordering on Eighth street; lots one and twelve in block eight and lots one and twelve in block nine, facing on A street; lots six and seven in block thirty-two, and lot six in block thirty-one, facing on E street; lots one and twenty-four in block twenty-seven, facing on C street; lots one to six, both inclusive, in block fifty-four, facing on Seventh street; lots one and twelve in block fifty-four, facing on F street; lots one to six, both inclusive, in block fifty-three, and lots one to six, both inclusive, in block sixty-eight, facing on Eighth street; all of the above described lots lying and being in the original plat of the City of Redmond. Also lots five to eight, both inclusive, in block one; lots six to ten, both inclusive, in block two; lots six to ten, both inclusive, in block three and lots six to ten, both inclusive, in block four of Ethret's First Addition to the City of Redmond, facing on A street. Also outlot twenty-one, more particularly described as follows: Commencing at a point sixty feet north of the northwest corner of block five, original plat of Redmond, thence east three hundred feet; thence north two hundred thirty-five feet; thence west three hundred feet and thence south two hundred thirty-five feet to place of commencement, facing on A street. Also lot two in block one and lots two and three in block two, of Mountain View Addition to Redmond, facing on E street.

Such sidewalk to be constructed of materials and in the manner as follows:

Of two inch plank, four feet long, laid crosswise on two stringers of two by six planks, the inside edge of said sidewalk to be three feet from the lot line of the premises in front of which the same is laid.

The whole of said sidewalk to be commenced within ninety days after the passage and publication of this resolution and to be completed within sixty days thereafter and the cost of the same to be assessed against the premises in front of which the same is constructed in proportion of the benefits to be derived from such improvement in the manner prescribed by law.

Provided, however, that the said sidewalk shall be built, constructed and laid without expense to the City of Redmond.
