### COUNTY SHORT COURSE IN PRINEVILLE FEB. 23

GOOD PROGRAM WILL BE GIVEN BY EXPERTS

Five Members of the O. A. C. Faculty Will Give Instruction on Different Subjects

The Short Course which the County High School has secured for this county will be held in Prineville from February 23 to 28 inclusive. This is during the light period on the ranch and will allow all who wish, time to attend. The hotels have promised to give reduced rates for that week, and the stage lines will make special rates to all who register in the Short Course.

All of the various phases of agriculture will be discussed by experts from the Oregon Agricultural College. But special emphasis will be placed on irrigation, dry farming, dairying and general stock farming. In domestic science those problems which confront the housewife in her daily routine will be discussed and solutions sought.

It is the aim of this Short Course to bring to the rancher of this county the largest amount of practical information, in the time available, concerning the various problems of your farm, and to supply this information in such a way that you can understand it and apply it to your ranch, with the result of more money in your pocket.

Now is the time to begin to plan your work so that you can spend the week in Prineville on the above date, hearing what the experts have to say, talking with ranchers who have the same problems that you have, and learning how they solve them.

For further information regarding the Short Course write to Professor Pratt, Prineville, who has charge of the arrangement.

### IMPROVING LIGHT PLANT AT CLINE FALLS HOUSE

Early this month the Deschutes Power Co., the company that furnishes light, power and heat for Redmond and other cities and towns in the county, installed a 350 horse power Sampson turbine water wheel at their auxiliary power plant at Cline Falls to take the place of one of the old wheels there. The Cline Falls plant is held as an auxiliary plant in case of a break down at the main plant at The Cove.

### IMPROVING SIXTH STREET

Street Commissioner Adams is making some needed improvements on 6th street by grading the street from C to F streets and putting on cinders. He expects to put on 150 loads of cinders, which are hauled from the cinder pit north of the city. Many of the business men contributed money for having the cinders put on the street.

### TWO MEN FROM THE DALLES PLEASSED WITH REDMOND

J. C. Thrall and G. H. Jacobson, both from The Dalles, were here last Saturday attending the G. A. Bradley livestock sale. The former was the auctioneer in charge of the sale, and the latter is a cattle breeder in The Dalles district. Both men were extremely well pleased with this section of Central Oregon and predicted a great future for the Redmond District in the dairy industry. They said they were surprised to find such a prosperous country around here, and stated that all that was needed to make it the banner dairy and hog section of the state was the breeding of high grade stock.

### BASAALPUR MAGANDANGHINDUPO, OR RINKTUM DIDDY

Five cents' worth of good American cheese, grated; 1/4 small onion finely minced, 1/2 can of tomato soup, 1/4 cup of milk, white of one egg, one dessertspoonful of Worcestershire sauce, small piece of butter, salt and pepper to taste. Fry the onion in the butter to a light brown, add the soup with a pinch of soda, the cheese and the milk, cook a few minutes and just before removing from fire fold in the stiffly beaten white of egg. Pour over thin slices of toast. This amount serves six people and will cost not more than 25c. An inexpensive dish and very good.

The above makes a very appetizing dish, and the low cost will appeal to the economical housewife.

### SPRING COLONIST RATES Will Be in Effect March 15 and Continue 32 Days

Railroads in the northwest are beginning to advertise the spring colonist rates which will be in effect for 32 days beginning March 15. The rates will be the same as in former seasons, \$33 from Chicago, \$30 from Missouri river points and \$25 from the Colorado region. Although the reduced rates will be advertised to a considerable extent, the roads state they will make no special effort to induce organized parties of home-seekers to come west.

They state that heretofore the low rates have been taken advantage of by wage earners, principally and that but few bona fide home-seekers are generally included in the large parties that come out each spring and fall. Genuine would-be settlers will come at any time of the year without waiting for special rates.
