#### Abstract of Laws Governing the Registration, Primaries and General Election

Cut this article out and keep it for easy reference, as you will need to consult it several times between now and November. It contains information for prospective candidates and for the voters in general.

##### Primaries

Jan. 5—Opening of registration. May 1—Last day to register for primary election.

April 15—Last day to file petitions for nominations for county and district offices.

May 15—Primary election, polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

May 30—Last day for candidates to file statement of expenses. All candidates must file their declaration before circulating their petitions, and all candidates elected must file their acceptance with the certificate of nomination.

##### General Election

May 20—Opening of registration. Sept. 25—Last day to file certificates of nomination by political party or assembly for county and district.

Oct. 9—Last day to file certificate of nomination by individual electors for county, district and precinct.

Oct. 5—Last day to file petition for local option election.

Oct. 18—Last day to register. Nov. 3—General election polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

Nov. 18—Last day for candidates to file statement of expenditures. All candidates must file acceptance with certificate of nomination.

##### Filing Provisions Given

All nominating petitions and notices pertaining to candidates for the office of delegate to a party national convention, elector of President or Vice-President of the United States, United States senator in congress, governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, justice of the supreme court, attorney general, superintendent of public instruction, state printer, state engineer, dairy and food commissioner, commissioner and inspector of factories and workshops, commissioner of the railroad commission of Oregon, superintendent of a water division, judge of the circuit court, district or prosecuting attorney, state senator or representative in legislative assembly, or other office to be voted for in the state at large, or in a district composed of one or more counties, shall be filed with the secretary of state not less than 35 days before the primary election.

WIFE'S RHYME HELPS PROVE FARMER'S ALIENATION SUIT

#### Supreme Court Takes Notice of Effusion in Affirming \$1,000 Verdict for Crook County Man

A Salem dispatch of February 11 says: Romance with a poetical tinge figured in the damage suit for the alienation of his wife's affections of John W. Saxton of Crook county, against W. C. Barber, in which a verdict of \$1,000 for the plaintiff was affirmed by the Supreme Court today, Justice McNary writing the opinion.

It was recited that the plaintiff and defendant lived on adjoining farms and that the latter for a number of years had been attentive to Mrs. Saxton. He sent her candy and she wrote verses to him, according to the evidence. One of her effusions is alleged to have been written on a postcard and was as follows:

Don't stand around the corner  
And try your best to flirt;  
Don't smile and give the naughty eye  
To everyone who wears a skirt.

Now if you do not change your ways,  
It will cease to be a joke,  
For some sweet girlie's brother  
Will give you an awful soak.

The plaintiff sued for \$30,000 damages. Justice McNary says: "There was evidence to show the continued associations of the defendant with the plaintiff's wife over a period of years under circumstances as to suggest a studied and intentional purpose to alienate her affections from her husband. He supplied her with funds to leave her home and her husband when she became peeved at something he did."

The court said the jealous anxiety of Mrs. Saxton for Mr. Barber is shown by the verses on the postcard sent to him.

#### PLAN TO DO AWAY WITH THREE BOARDS

(Continued from 1st page)

"One of the causes of the high cost of living," said the governor, "is the gradual growth and increased demands of boards and commissions."

He declared that the Desert Land Board, as now constituted, is a useless affair, and the State Engineer's office is an expensive luxury. The plan is to give the one board to be created in place of the three departments authority to appoint an engineer.

While there is now a state engineer's department, he said it was necessary to employ a special engineer whenever any work was to be

done by the state. He said in addition to the regular appropriations made for the state engineer's office, there were always a number of extra appropriations made for work connected with that office.

The work of the Desert Land Board, the State Engineer's office and the State Water Board could be handled by one board with a great deal less cost than the taxpayers are paying for those departments now, said the governor. He pointed out also that while the State Engineer is secretary of the Desert Land Board, another person is employed to do the secretarial work. The State Water Board also has a secretary. One of these positions would be eliminated by the proposed change.

The governor said the measure would be initiated by the people of Central Oregon.

The present incumbents of the offices who will be affected by the proposed change are John H. Lewis, State Engineer; James Chinnock of Salem, superintendent of water division No. 1, and George T. Cochran of La Grande, superintendent of water division No. 2. All are candidates for re-election. As members of the State Desert Land Board hold other state offices, they would not be affected.
