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WILL BE OF HELP TO NEW HOMESEEEKERS

NEW METHOD OF LISTING LAND
IN THE STATE WILL BE
BENEFICIAL

J. W. Brewer, state locating agent of the Oregon State Immigration Commission, while here this week, showed The Spokesman the form of blank that is being used for listing lands. The introductory remarks on the blank are right to the point and are as follows:

Information hereon is for the benefit of homeseekers and settlers and not for speculators or buyers who will hold land out of use.

Descriptions based on this listing will be published from time to time so that homeseekers may see what there is for sale in different portions of the state and thereby may be aided to decide where to visit to examine lands and investigate local conditions.

Expense of travel is heavy for homeseekers; the purpose of these listings is to help him avoid needless expense.

A satisfied homeseeker advantageously located in a progressive neighborhood, is Oregon's best advertisement.

If the homeseeker cannot find land at a price that appears to him reasonable, he becomes discouraged and goes elsewhere at heavy expense or returns to his former home, usually stating that Oregon has no opportunity for him or others like him.

With correct description of land offered at attractive prices, on file at the State Information Office in Portland, and printed in state publications, the homeseeker has an opportunity to find what he wants and Oregon is the gainer.

Land owners are urged to co-operate by listing lands, making descriptions of same honest and conservative and by helping homeseekers see the land with a minimum of expense after arriving at the railway station.

No commission or fees are accepted or shared by the Oregon State Immigration Commission.

The Attorney General holds that if a Republican registered voter, for instance, signs the petition of half a dozen Republican candidates for the gubernatorial nomination the voter's name is to be counted on each petition. He says the law intends to make it as easy as possible for candidates to get before the people.

come from a cholera infested region. Let them make absolutely sure that they carry them in properly disinfected cars. These two precautions taken, they need not bring in hog cholera.

The ranchmen of the Northwest must not imagine that the pure air of that region will give them immunity from hog cholera. It will not, where the germ is brought in, but it may lessen the mortality. They must not conclude that the foods which may grow will be a safeguard. These will lessen the mortality, but they will not prevent the introduction of hog cholera. When it comes it is brought through the medium of some agency, and usually due precaution will prevent it from coming.
