up the plant at The Cove, but with the new installation this stoppage will be obviated.

Another improvement the company has recently installed is the placing of volt registers in the offices at Redmond, Prineville and Madras. This is a piece of mechanism that is operated by clock work and keeps perfect check on the voltage at the generating plant. A governor at The Cove plant has lately been installed that is a very delicate piece of machinery

and regulates the operation of the whole generating system there.

The plants at both The Cove and Cline Falls are kept in perfect condition, free from dust and dirt, and every piece of machinery shines as bright as a new silver dollar. Manager Simpson will not stand for any dirt or carelessness around the plants and those who like to see massive machinery in operation should make an inspection trip to either The Cove or Cline Falls.

**FOREST NOTES**

Dr. C. D. Marsh of the federal bureau of plant industry is delivering a series of illustrated lectures to stockmen in the West on the subject of plants poisonous to stock.

The Biltmore forest school, established in 1898 and therefore the oldest forest school in America, has been discontinued. Dr. C. A. Schenk, its director, has returned to his home in Germany.

The forest service is compiling a new volume table for calculating the board contents of standing western yellow pine trees in the Southwest. It is based on actual measurements of 6,000 trees.

In trying to find uses for blight-killed chestnut it has been found that it cannot be utilized for crating stone; quarry owners say that chestnut wood leaves an indelible stain on the marble or granite.

good man for the office and would pull a satisfactory vote throughout the county.

Mr. Doherty stated he was not urging himself on the west side as a candidate, but that a number of Prineville people had urged him to come out for treasurer, and said they would support him. Mr. Doherty said the right man, coming out for treasurer or clerk, would draw votes from the east side as well as the west side.

Editor Putnam stated all the west side was agreed on a man for commissioner, and as far as the present treasurer was concerned he was well liked, and that many people in Bend felt the same way as he did, and he did not think this meeting should consider any other candidate except for the office of county commissioner.

O. A. Pearce of Madras, said as regards a candidate for treasurer being put up at the meeting, that he was not in a position to commit himself.

R. B. Gould, manager of the Bend Commercial Club, said he was in favor of letting Prineville and the east side have all the offices to be filled at the coming election with the exception of county commissioner.

G. W. Wells of this city, was in favor of uniting on the one office—county commissioner—and working to the utmost to elect Mr. Bayley to that office.

W. S. Rodman of this city, moved that the meeting do not indorse any candidate for an office except for county commissioner, which motion prevailed.

C. S. Hudson of Bend, presented a motion that carried which authorized Chairman Lynch to appoint a campaign committee in each section and polling place in the county to work for the election of Mr. Bayley.

Mr. Pearce of Madras, brought up the question of county division and stated that the people in his section would like to get the sentiment of the delegates at the meeting in regard to the matter.

W. S. Rodman of this city, and other delegates, expressed themselves as opposed to taking up the matter of county division at this time. Mr. Pearce stated he was of the opinion that the county division question would be taken up at the meeting, but he would not press the matter any further.

No other business appearing before the convention the meeting adjourned, after Chairman Lynch stated he would announce the names of the members of the campaign committee at a later date.
