COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

OFFICIAL REPORT

Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Redmond, Oregon, was held at the office of the City Recorder on the 24th day of March, 1914. Present, Mayor Hosch, Councilmen Reedy, De Souza, Atkinson and Immele. Meeting called to order by Mayor Hosch. Councilman Immele acted as Recorder.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved. On motion the following bills were approved and ordered paid:

On motion the bill of A. Munz for the sum of \$15.45 was referred to the Water Committee. On motion the bill of A. Munz for the sum of \$21.65 was referred to the Finance Committee.

Moved and seconded that the bill of the Neptune Meter Company be referred to the Water Committee for checking.

Moved and seconded that the bond of Alfred Munz for plumbing be approved.

Report of City Attorney Wilcox on telephone franchise read and placed on file.

Moved and seconded that the Ordinance Committee refer all recommendations of the City Attorney and all such additional clauses as to comply with the state law to the Deschutes Mutual Telephone Company for the drafting of a new franchise, to be presented at the next regular meeting of council.

Ordinance No. 35, being an ordinance

providing for sidewalk space, the location of sidewalks therein; the planting of shade trees thereon, and the removal of weeds therefrom, read in full.

Moved and seconded that when the Redmond Townsite Company actually gives the city the concessions as represented by it, that is, the boulevard and the deed to the jail lot, the city will vacate the streets and alleys prayed for.

Roll call ordered. Yeas—Reedy, De Souza, Atkinson, Immele.

Be it resolved by the Common Council of the City of Redmond that the minimum water rate be \$1.25 for 300 cubic feet; all in excess of 300 cubic feet, 30 cents per 100 cubic feet. That wherever water is carried the owner of the hydrant shall be charged an additional minimum rate for each individual carrying from his hydrant. Every residence, or business house, other than office, using water shall be connected by meter. All parties carrying water must make proper connections with city mains within three months time, or cease using city water. Meters to be read the first of April, 1914, and on the 25th day of each month thereafter. City Recorder to collect minimum in advance, excess reading to be added to minimum for succeeding month. The City Marshal shall read the meters.

Matter of sprinkling the streets for the ensuing season referred to the Street and Alley Committee. Matter of grading streets referred back to the Street and Alley Committee for further action.

The question of installing a new pump at the pumping plant was thoroughly discussed by the council with the representative of the Fairbanks Morse Company. The following are a few facts in reference to the pump: Pump to have a capacity of 250 gallons per minute; lift, 380 feet; weight, 9,000 lbs.; cost, \$1,400

f. o. b. Portland; cost of man to superintend installation, \$7.50 per day and expenses; size of pump, 6x12, duplex, center pack, plunger pattern power pump; terms, one-third upon receipt of pump, balance with city warrant drawing 7 per cent interest.

Moved and seconded that the fire chief be authorized to purchase a cart for the fire ladders and present bill to council. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the Central Oregon Garage be granted permission to install electric light in their oil house. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the 7th day of April be designated as clean-up day. (Carried.)

Moved and seconded that the council have requisition blanks printed to be used whenever purchasing supplies for the city. Roll call order. Yeas—Reedy, Immele, Nays—Atkinson, De Souza. Vote being a tie, Mayor Hosch cast the deciding vote against the measure.

Moved and seconded that the council adjourn. (Carried.)

INDUSTRIAL REVIEW OF THE PAST WEEK

Lane county manufacturers have adopted resolutions favoring the use of Oregon building stone and Oregon made steel on public structures.

Steel for the \$800,000 Southern Pacific bridge across Coos Bay is being rushed to the scene of construction.

Drewsey, in Harney county, is to be the scene of an electrical development and an electric railroad.

A large sand and gravel plant is being installed at Shady Point, near

Sutherlin, with a spur from the S. P. railroad.

Smithfield, Lane county, farmers are agitating a cannery.

Albany city council has adopted resolutions looking to acquiring a municipal light and power plant for that city.

J. M. Eddy and associates have organized a company to operate a hal salt rock quarry on Kentuck Inlet, North Bend.

The Oregon Power Co. will spend \$10,000 on a new fuel plant at Eugene.

The Peoples bank at Silverton is to be remodeled.

The Roseburg Brewing and Ice Co. has a contract for icing cars, that necessitates doubling the capacity of their plant.

All industries will be relieved in Oregon by the decision of Judge McGinn allowing semi-annual payment of taxes.

Twoby Bros. of Portland, will employ 400 men in building the Echo-Coyote cutoff of 20 miles on the O. W. R. & N., to cost \$800,000.

Oscar E. Helitz has contracted to build a 5-story block for the Blake-McFall Paper Co. of Portland, 100x 200 feet.

The five large shingle and lumber plants at Raymond have decided that the 1500 men employed by them shall work under open shop rules.

Clackamas county will build a steel bridge at Barton over the Clackamas river, and install a rock crusher at Sandy.

Guthrie, McDougal & Co. of Portland, have the contract for constructing a large section of the Puget Sound and Willapa Harbor Ry.

T. J. Scammon of Goldendale, is starting a large private fish hatchery plant in the Ten Mile region near Coos Bay.

The Eugene flouring mills have run steadily since 1895 without a shut down, and turned out \$160,000 of product in 1913.
