Bristow for Redmond was caught at first; Branton walked, and stole second and third; W. L. Perry hit to left and Branton



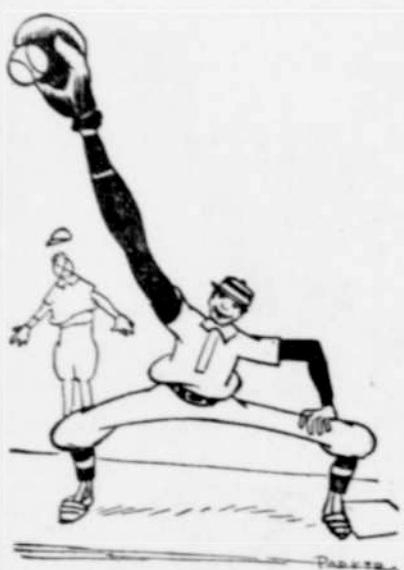

Seventh Inning—In this inning Tetherow went into the box



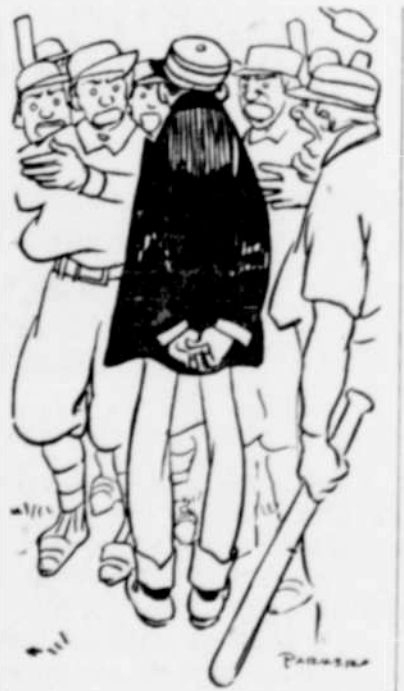

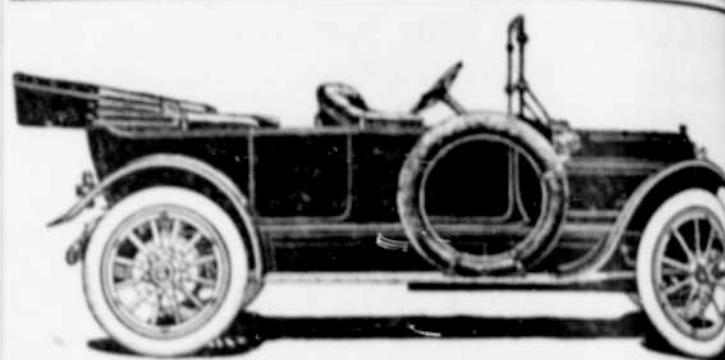
