Burdick made a "heart disease" one hand catch of a hot liner in the fourth inning.

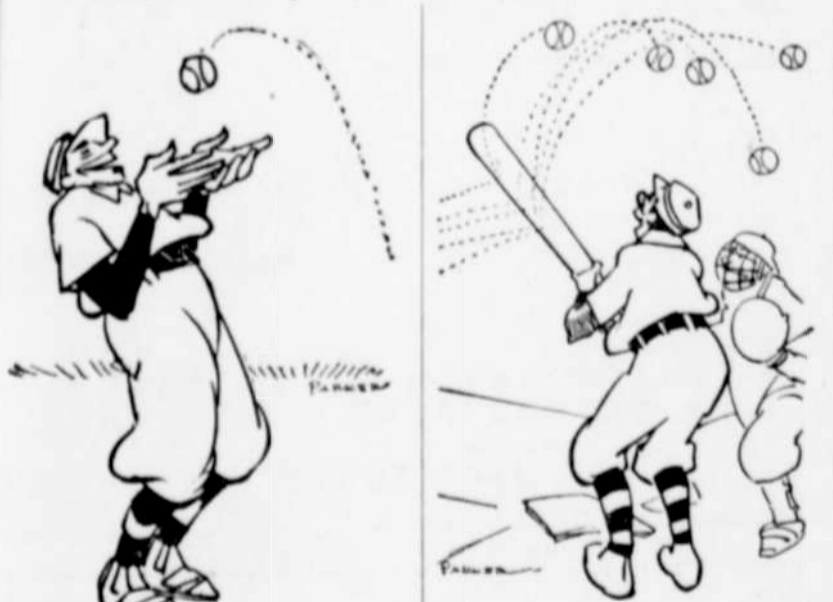


Shelley Beat the Ball Every Time.
