

HEAVE ROCKS AT BILLY SUNDAY

New York Ministers Unite in a Bitter Attack Upon Spectacular Evangelist

SUNDAY TELLS THEM TO "GO TO HELL!"

Pastors Believe Results Accomplished by Sunday Are Too Small for the Big Expense Incurred—Disrespect for Cloth.

Violent attacks on "Billy" Sunday and his evangelistic methods, with figures intended to prove that his crusades for christianity were expensive, ineffectual and undignified, were heard at the meeting of the Methodist ministers of Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Jersey conference held in New York City last week. The attacks on Sunday became so bitter that one minister, Rev. Dr. C. F. Reinsner of Grace Church, prevailed on the body to go into session behind closed doors.

One of the chief complaints heard was that Sunday has little respect for the cloth, and shows it when he is engaged in an evangelistic campaign.

"If you criticize 'Billy' Sunday he tells you to go to hell," was a report by Rev. E. E. Piper, pastor of a Pittsburg church, who was a part of the Pittsburg machine organized to conduct the recent campaign in that city.

Mr. Piper also asserted that Sunday abused the Protestant churches "in the worst kind of billingsgate, but never once said aught against the Roman Catholic Church."

There were 350 ministers present. Many of them sought a chance to speak, and the applause at the attacks on Sunday indicated that the ministers do not favor bringing Sunday to New York City for a religious revival.

One of the Rev. Mr. Piper's complaints anent the Pittsburg campaign was that converts at the Sunday rate do not pay. He said the expense had been \$90,000, and that the number of persons induced to join all churches in Pittsburg as a result of the campaign was 3107.

New York Methodists declared they could do better themselves. They concluded that about 11 in 100 of the 3107 converts would stick, possibly 12, and that 400 church members or less, at a cost of \$90,000 in money and a vast deal of hard work, was a too high price. It amounts to more than \$250 per convert—the calculation being that there were about 341 of them.

One hundred and sixty-two Pittsburg churches joined in the Sunday campaign. Sixty reported no converts received. One hundred and two reported 1709 actual members received and 1490 indirectly.

There was much complaint against Sunday's requirement that all the churches close during his campaign. Former Supt. Chadwick of the Monday Conference, expressed it thus:

"Are we ready to get down on our knees to Sunday? Do we want to close up 96 of our churches in order that Sunday may manage them? Shall our Protestant churches in New York go out of business for a month that Sunday may have something to do?"

Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Redmond, Oregon, held at the office of the City Recorder on the 14th day of April, 1914. Present, Mayor Hoach, Councilmen Reedy, De Souza, Atkinson, Farris and Immele. Meeting called to order by Mayor Hoach.

Minutes of the last meeting read and approved. On motion the following bills were approved and ordered paid:

Moved, seconded and passed that the bills of C. R. McLallin amounting to \$52.60 be referred to J. G. McGuffie for approval.

Moved, seconded and passed that the bill of Mrs. H. H. Fay for cinders be allowed. Roll call ordered. Yeas—De Souza, Atkinson, Farris, Immele. Nays—Reedy.

Moved, seconded and passed that bill of Alfred Munz for \$39.57 be referred to the Finance Committee.

Ordinance No. 37, being an ordinance providing for sidewalk space, the location of sidewalks therein, the planting of shade trees thereon and the removal of weeds therefrom, read for second time. Roll call ordered. Yeas—De Souza, Atkinson, Farris, Immele, Reedy. Passed.

Ordinance No. 36, granting to the Deschutes Mutual Telephone Company and assigns the right to erect, maintain and operate in the City of Redmond, Crook county, Oregon, in all the alleys and in D and E streets, and beginning with E street every alternate street south of E street, and beginning with D street every alternate street north of D street, wires and other conductors for the transmission of electricity for telephone purposes. Read for third time. Roll call ordered. Yeas—De Souza, Atkinson, Farris, Immele and Reedy. Passed.

Ordinance No. 38, providing for the appointment of a city veterinarian, prescribing his duties and salary; prohibiting the sale of fresh meats within the city which have not been inspected by him and prescribing penalties. Read for first time.

Moved, seconded and passed that the council offer C. A. Adams \$45 per month for the use of one team for city purposes.

Moved, seconded and passed that the Recorder be instructed to secure one guaranteed tested meter to be used for test purposes.

Moved, seconded and passed that any water users residing outside of the corporate limits and securing water from the municipal system shall be forthwith charged one rate and one-half for all water used.

Moved, seconded and passed that the Marshal be instructed to secure an adequate number and style of seals to be used for the purpose of sealing all water meters installed in the city.

Moved, seconded and passed that the council adjourn.

Bristow was hit in the back by the pitcher and went to first; Tetherow flew out to center field, retiring the side.

Bend—Steve struck out; Staats was hit in the leg and went to first, stole second and scored on "Fat's" hit to first; "Fat" was put out when he tried to steal third; Johnson drew a pass, but died on second when McReynolds struck out.

Third Inning

Redmond—Branton whiffed. Hudson hit to the pitcher and was out at first; L. Perry ambled, stole second and third and came home on a passed ball; Bush hit to third and was smothered at first.

Bend—McKeen hit an infield fly to Bush; Gully hit to Shelley and was thrown out at first; McKay hit to short and died the same way.

Fourth Inning

Redmond—Shelley hit to second and went out at first; A. Perry tried a bunt, but couldn't make it; Fleming hit to short and was nailed to the cross at first.

Bend—Gibbs made a clean hit over second, stole second and third, but was caught asleep at the switch by Tetherow; Steve beat the ozone;

Staats was hit and took first, tried to steal second, but was canned.

Fifth Inning

Redmond—Bristow flew out to center field; Tetherow hit a high, infield fly which was muffed by Gibbs; Tetherow stole second and was doubled up when Gully took in Branton's bid for a bingle to left.

Bend—"Fat" hit to second and perished at first; Johnson breezed on three of Bush's fast curves; McReynolds walked and died on first, as McKeen also struck out.

Sixth Inning

Redmond—Hudson hit to short and was safe at first on the bobble; L. Perry hit to third and beat the throw to first; Bush flew out to right field, Hudson and L. Perry advancing a sack after the catch; Shelley hit to second and was thrown out at first, Hudson scoring; L. Perry added another score by stealing home; A. Perry fanned.

Bend—Gully hit between first and second for a bag, but was caught napping by Bristow; McKay hit to first and was out; Gibbs flew out to short.

Seventh Inning

Redmond—Fleming hit to third and reached first, stole second and third, and scored when Bristow slashed a single over third; Bristow stole second, and scored when Tetherow singled over short; Tetherow stole second and third and scored when Branton shot a single to center field; Hudson hit to first and was out; Bush drove a single to left, advancing Branton to third; L. Perry took three swings and retired; Bush stole second, and Branton came home when the catcher fumbled the ball; Shelley hit to short and was safe at first; A. Perry skied out to second.

Bend—Steve drew a pass and stole second and third; Staats hit to Bush and was killed off at first; Ralph hit to center for a single and Steve scored, making two runs for Bend; Johnson was presented with free transportation to first (Bush route); McReynolds struck out, and McKeen hit to first and was out.

Eighth Inning

Redmond—A. Perry walked and pliffed second; Fleming shot one down the third base line and was safe at first; Bristow slammed one to center field, scoring Perry; Tetherow hit to second and reached first, Fleming scoring on the play; Tetherow garnered second and advanced to third when Branton rolled an infield single to second; Branton stole second, and Hudson hit to short and was thrown out at first; L. Perry got his eye on one and lammed it to left field for three cushions, scoring Tetherow and Branton; Bush poled one to short, but was out at first; Perry reaching home on the play; Shelley hit to second and perished.

Bend—Gully hit to second and was an easy out; McKay had his waiting clothes on and drew a walk; McKay pliffed second; Gibbs slashed one to third, but "Old Cannonball" Jesse winged him out at the first station; Steve hoisted a fly to center field.

Ninth Inning

Redmond—A. Perry lifted one to right, but it settled in a net; Fleming rolled one to the pitcher and was an easy out at first; Bush hit to the shortstop and beat the throw; Bush stole second and third and scored when Tetherow sizzled one to center for a single; Tetherow stole second and third; Branton hit to second and died at first.

Bend—Staats was thrown out at first by the shortstop; "Fat" shot one to Tetherow, who winged him at first; Johnson couldn't see Bush's benders and fanned, leaving the score at 17 to 2 in favor of Redmond.

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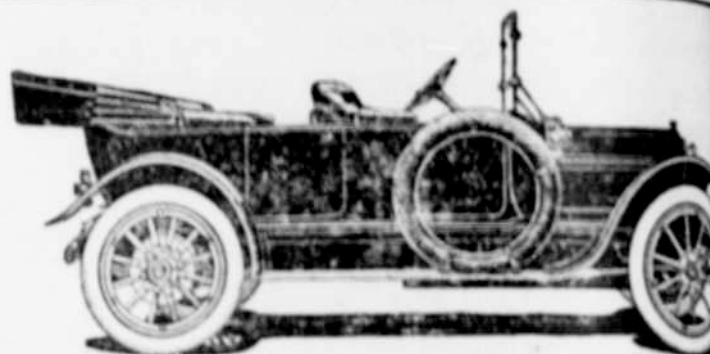
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
