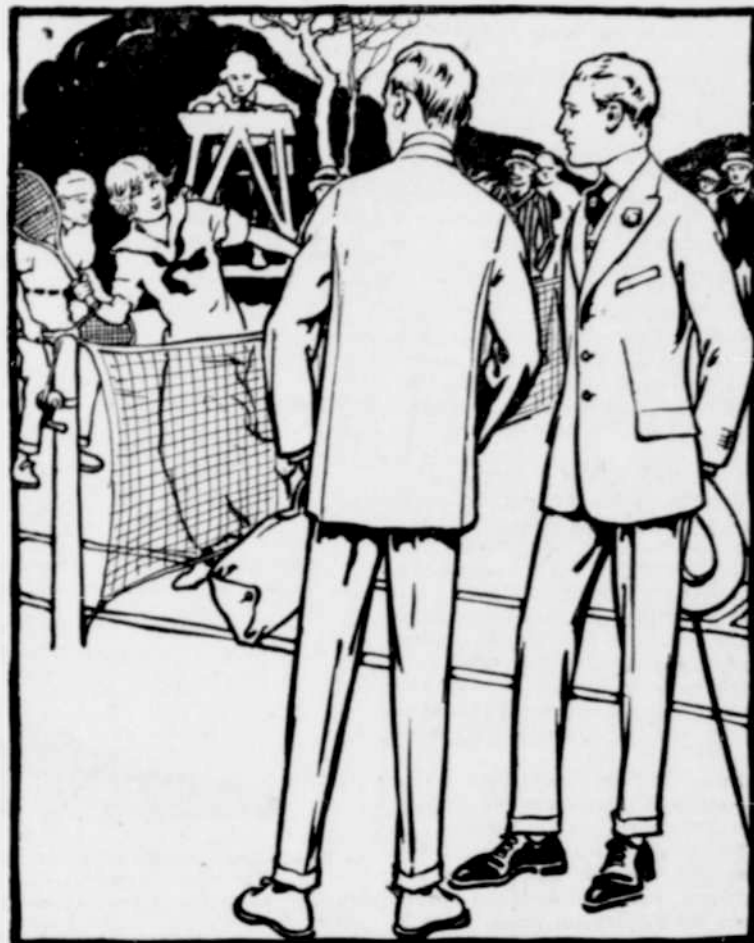

IS NOW UP TO THE STATE ENGINEER

Des Chutes, Ore., April 14, 1914. Mr. James P. Bates, Redmond, Ore. Dear Sir: In accordance with promises made to people at Redmond some time ago, at a meeting where Mr. Lewis was presenting some data on our canals, I have to say that this morning we turned through the North Canal into the Pilot Butte Canal 333 cubic second feet of water for a period of about one-half hour. The canal carried this water safely. The requirements for all land under the Pilot Butte Canal, allowing one second foot for every 70 irrigable acres, are 306 cubic second feet, so there is no reason why the government should not patent Patent List No. 6, which has been held up so long.
