PRINEVILLE WON MOST EVENTS AT TRACK MEET HERE FRIDAY

SCHOOLS WELL REPRESENTED HERE ON THE 15th AT THE CROOK COUNTY FIELD DAY AND DECLAMATION CONTEST—PRINEVILLE SCORED THE MOST POINTS—DECLAMATORY CONTEST PROGRAM INTERESTING AND WELL RENDERED BEFORE LARGE AUDIENCE

The different High Schools of the county, Prineville, Madras, Bend, Terrebonne and Redmond turned out a large number of pupils, parents of pupils and those interested in schools, to the Crook County Field Day and Declamatory Contest held here last Friday, May 15.

The weather was all that could be desired and the program for the day was put through without a hitch. County Superintendent Myers and the principals of the different schools had worked hard to make the event a success, and they are well satisfied with the results obtained.

Last year Redmond took first place in the field events, but this year Prineville was first with a score of 111.

"Oregon will be called upon frequently this fall to furnish exhibit material for Eastern Land Shows, Eastern State Fairs, and for traveling exhibit cars.

"A high standard was set last year with our exhibits—they were first everywhere. In order to maintain this established reputation it will be necessary that your progressive growers keep in mind the importance of saving samples.

"Will you help us to secure good specimens by notifying the growers of the necessity, and by giving this local publicity, etc. We will strictly adhere to the former policy of labeling all samples in the name of the county and grower. Credit will be justly distributed.

WITHYCOMBE IS NOMINATED FOR GOV. BY REPUBLICANS

SMITH IS CHOICE OF DEMOCRATS FOR GOVERNOR, WITH BENNETT A CLOSE SECOND—GEORGE M. BROWN FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL—JOHN H. LEWIS FOR STATE ENGINEER—RESULT OF ELECTION IN CROOK COUNTY SHOWS R. H. BAYLEY WAS DEFEATED FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONER BY SMALL MAJORITY

Dr. James Withycombe of Corvallis, and Dr. C. J. Smith of Portland, will be the Republican and Democratic candidates respectively, for Governor in the November election. Following is the vote in the state for Republican candidates for Governor:

Withycombe, 17,402; Moser, 13,625; Crawford, 11,778; Carter 8,739; Dimick, 9,014; Geer, 6,735.

The Democratic vote for Governor was: Smith, 11,348; Bennett, 10,041; Manning, 4,581; Cobb, 1,679; Miller, 1,000.

O. P. Hoff is nominated for Labor Commissioner, Frank J. Miller for Railroad Commissioner, John H. Lewis for State Engineer by a majority of about 20,000, and Ralph E. Williams for National Committeeman.

On the Democratic ticket H. M. Esterly is the chosen National Committeeman.

George M. Brown is the Republican nominee for Attorney General. Thomas A. McBride, Henry J. Bean, Lawrence T. Harris and Charles J. McNary are the Republican nominees for the Supreme Court.
