### ROLL-TOP DESK IS BARRED

In the Interest of Efficiency Eastern Railroad Equips Its Offices With Modern Furnishings.

This is an age of efficiency, and in the successful stores, offices, and corporations one sees many things that make for more efficient work on the part of every one from the big boss down to the janitor.

Nowhere perhaps is efficiency more rigidly demanded than on most of the railroads. An order just issued by an Eastern railroad is illustrative of the point. This order forbids the use of roll-top desks by any of the employees—all offices from the president's down and all those along the system have been equipped with flat-top desks.

This is so the men will not cram pigeonholes full of papers and pile work and papers on their desks, close them up and go home. The man with a flat-top desk will clear it off before leaving. In fact it's mandatory in this case, and he steps up to his desk the next morning, not having to fuss and fume over a pile of unsorted papers, but ready to dig right in on the day's job. There's nothing left undone from yesterday.

### An Extraordinary Dwelling.

A remarkable dwelling place is situated at Blendon, Kent, England. Standing in the corner of an agricultural field of many acres, it was formerly a chapel, probably the private chapel of the owner of a large estate in the immediate neighborhood. It has been many times restored, great care being taken to keep it true to its original form, the interior, especially the roof and spire, being formed of wrought oak beams. Strangers to the neighborhood, who are ignorant of its history, when out for a stroll on Sunday, often attempt to enter the building, under the impression that they may attend a service there, and are astonished to find that it is in reality in use as a dwelling-house. The exact history of the building is lost, and antiquarians from all parts of the world are continually calling to inspect what is to them a complete mystery. Many explanations are offered by the oldest inhabitants of the neighborhood, and strange tales are told concerning it.

### American Caviar Popular.

The use of the roe salmon and other American fish for the making of caviar is growing rapidly, and as a result what at one time was a serious waste has been turned into an excellent and valuable food. The principal difference between this caviar and the Russian caviar is that the Russian article is made principally out of sturgeon roe, while American caviar is made from salmon roe, white fish roe, and the roe of other fish that are handled on a large commercial scale as well as from sturgeon roe.

This caviar is made in the same manner as the Russian caviar. The roe is pressed through screens, which allow the eggs to pass, but hold back all the membrane and the egg sacks. These eggs are then packed in a large quantity of salt, which draws some of the water and other substances from them.

### Great Painting Damaged.

The hall in the Rijks museum, in Amsterdam, which contains Rembrandt's "The Night Watch," painted in 1642, was specially built to hold the picture, that the lighting might be as perfect as possible. The picture is always lighted; the hall always dark. Originally the picture was arranged badly as to light and space. When in 1715 it was transferred from the Doelen to the town hall, it was made to fit into its new position by saving strips cut off the canvas on either side and off the top, which destroyed the balance.

As the service is in the hands of a private company, and not as here a department of the post-office, we may unreservedly congratulate that ancient city on its new acquisition, remarks the London Globe. It is curious to read that several Turkish girls will be found among the operators. This is a new and highly significant departure, and is said to have the full approval of the government.
