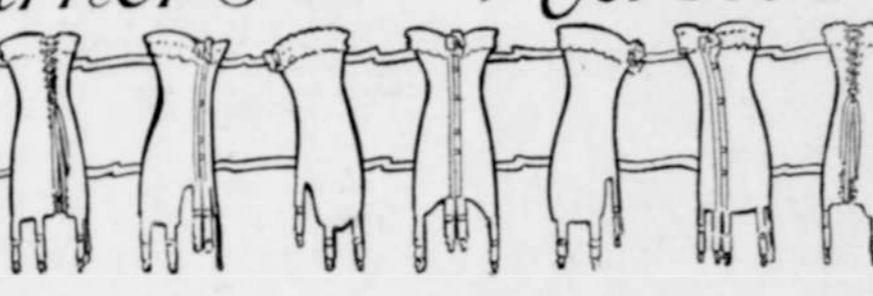

Taken in its entirety the voice is one which Oregon may well be proud of, for it expresses with ease all the emotions."
