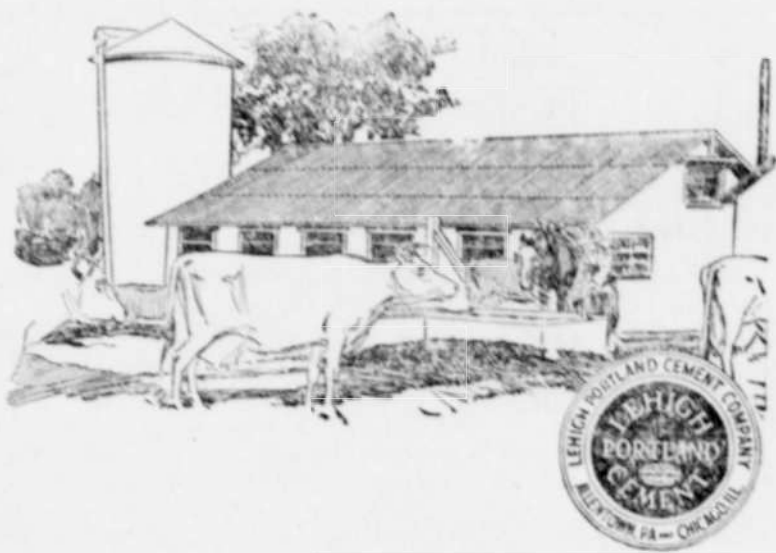

#### FREAK POTATOES ARE SUBTERRANEAN WONDERS

Portland Telegram: R. J. Abbott, an operator in the Portland fire department, stationed at fire headquarters in the city hall, has some freak potatoes growing in his garden at 453 Thirty-eighth street North, which he believes are prizewinners.

The feature of these particular spuds is that they grow splendidly, but do not have tops. Some time ago Mr. Abbott planted his potatoes and then awaited developments. Some of them came up and today have tops about four inches high. Others failed to show any growth and, wondering why, he dug up a few hills. To his surprise he found the potatoes growing nicely, but there was not a sign of a green sprout. He attributes this to the fact that his place is near the big brick plant, and the waste from this has packed the ground until it is exceptionally hard. This, he believes has killed off the tops, but has in no way hurt the growth of the spuds, which were planted only about four inches under the surface.
