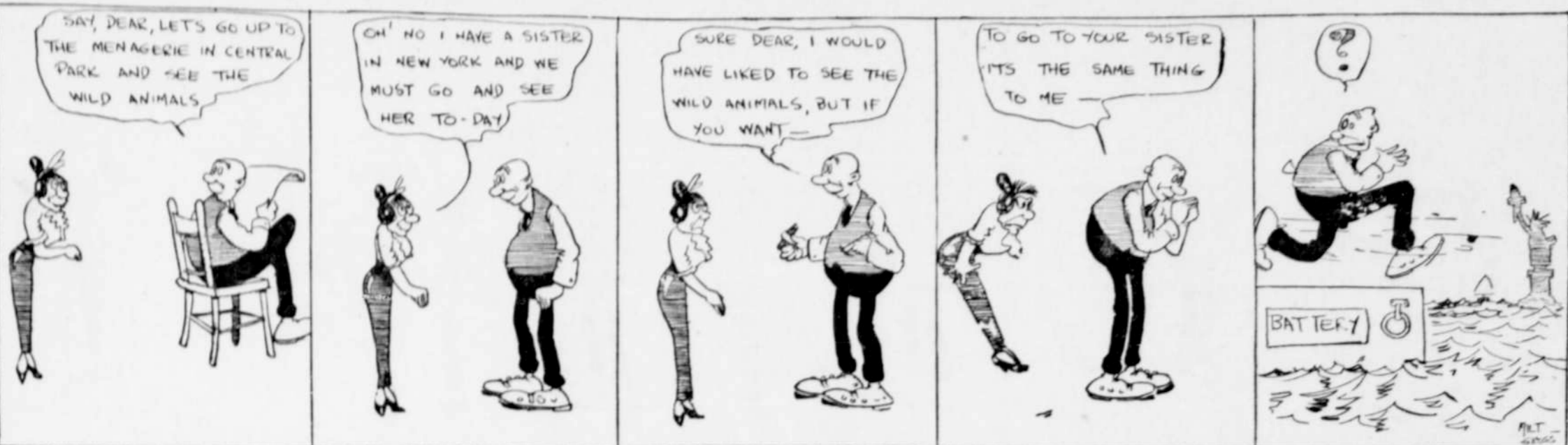

AN IMPORTANT ROAD FOR CROOK COUNTY

WORK ON THE MCKENZIE ROAD IS TO START SOON

Estimated That \$3,750 of Crook County Money Will Put Road in Good Condition

The Sisters Herald of last week says: Work on the McKenzie road is to start as soon as the necessary survey can be made. Forest service officials and Commissioner Bayley will go over the route the last of the week and start with the survey at once. This work will be rushed so as to get at the actual improvement as early a date as possible.

There is no road improvement in Crook county of as great importance to all sections as is the improvement of the McKenzie road. Crook county has long felt the need of a road connecting with the Willamette valley. This route has long been decided on as the most feasible—and the traveling public has always favored it as being the road they favored most.

Lane county and the government are spending more than \$100,000 on the west side of the Cascades on the McKenzie road. Many of the worst grades were improved last year, and the work has been under way for the past two months with a view to completing as much of the work during this year as possible. The work on the west side is being carried on under the direction of the forest service.

The estimated total expense of changing and reducing the grade on this side of the summit will not ex-

ceed \$7,500, which is a very small item when compared to the amount being spent on the west side and the benefit that will be derived by Crook county. Of this amount the forest service agrees to furnish half, which will reduce the county portion to the small sum of \$3,750. County Commissioner R. H. Bayley is a strong supporter of this road and is doing all in his power to see the work under way at as early a date as possible. The importance of having this road improved before the opening of the Panama-Pacific Exposition is great. The auto travel in all parts of the Northwest during next year will be heavy, and Crook county will have no better means of advertising than by the improvement of a scenic highway across the Cascades.
