Getting back to the meat proposition, I desire to state right here that the Redmond Meat Market will give the best service and variety that the country will afford.

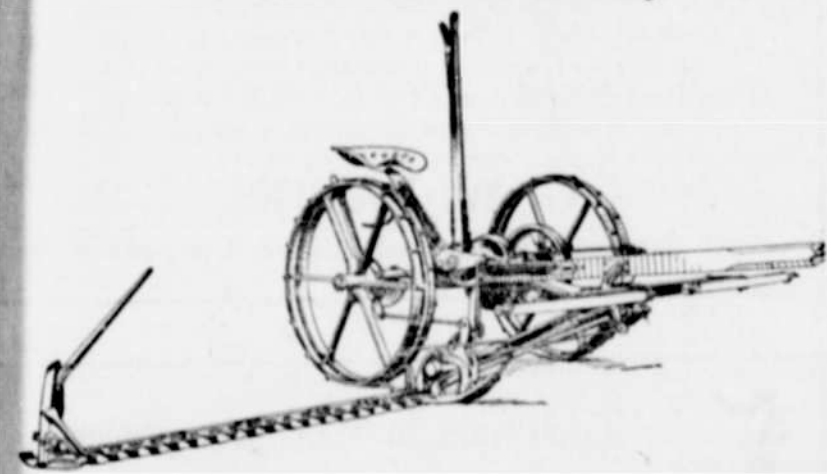

Department of the Interior, United States Land Office, The Dalles, Oregon, July 18, 1914.

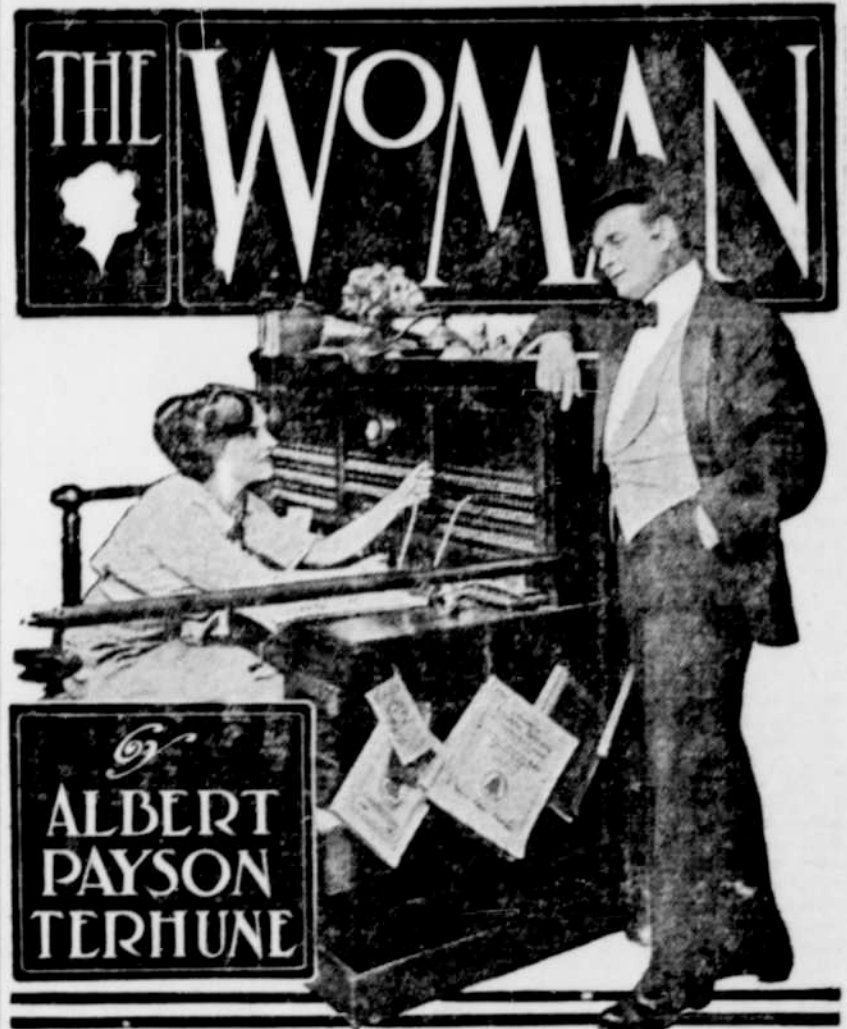
To Ernest Spuehler, of Bend, Oregon, contestee.

You are hereby notified that Louis R. Schmorl, who gives care of John Gavin, his attorney, The Dalles, Oregon, as his postoffice address, did on July 18, 1914, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your homestead entry, serial number 09253, made July 11, 1911, for SW 1/4 section 13, township 20 S, range 14 E, Willamette meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that entryman wholly abandoned said land shortly after filing thereon, and said land has never been fenced, plowed or improved in any manner and is without house, and open to the public range.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be cancelled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within 20 days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.
