VOTING FOR BONDS

City officials state that it is absolutely necessary the City of Redmond have \$10,000 in order to carry on improvements at the city water plant, and for other purposes.

This amount can be secured by issuing city warrants bearing 10 per cent interest, which would make the interest total \$1,000 per annum.

On the other hand, if bonds carry at the special election Saturday, August 15, the \$10,000 to be voted for will carry but 6 per cent interest, which would be a total of \$600 a year in interest—**A SAVING OF FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS A YEAR TO THE CITY.**

It is stated the city has to have the \$10,000, and if bonds do not carry warrants will be issued for that amount.

IT IS UP TO THE VOTERS WHETHER THEY WANT TO PAY \$1,000 A YEAR INTEREST FOR \$10,000 OR \$600 A YEAR INTEREST ON THE SAME AMOUNT.

PAPER IS GOING UP

The price of white print paper and other paper will be advanced, according to advices sent out from the wholesale houses. The Canadian authorities have announced that no more wood pulp (from which white print paper is made) will be exported from there until the present war is over.

American paper manufacturers buy large quantities of the raw wood pulp from Canada, and the curtailing of the supply will necessarily limit the supply of paper made and the price is to go up in consequence.

There is considerable white paper made on the Coast, in Oregon and Washington, the whole manufacturing being done in these two states, and they do not have to depend upon Canada or any other foreign country for raw wood pulp. The paper manufactured by the Coast mills is all used in the Coast section, and the Middle Western and Eastern states do not get any of it. The paper supply for those sections comes mainly from the Eastern mills, who depend largely upon Canada for their raw wood pulp. Still, a large amount of white print paper, and almost all of the finer grades of white paper, used on the Coast are shipped from Eastern mills. Printing offices in Oregon and Washington outside of the large dailies, use Eastern white print paper almost exclusively. The daily papers, those using paper in rolls, most of them buy the Coast made paper.

The Eastern made paper is a little lighter in color than that made on the Coast and seems to find a ready sale in hundreds of printing offices here. The advance in price of paper will affect these offices and may be a reason for the newspapers to raise the price of their subscription.

LAWS OF NEUTRALITY

Portland Telegram: The proclamation of neutrality made by President Wilson enjoins American citizens and residents within the United States to obey the laws, rules and principles governing the conduct of neutrals in time of international conflict. Those who do not do so will be subject to penalties prescribed by law. All American citizens who undertake to violate neutrality outside the jurisdiction of the United States are warned that they cannot expect any protection from the Washington government.

American citizens are forbidden while within the United States to accept a commission from either of the combatants. They may not enlist as a soldier, sailor or marine or induce another person to enlist. They may not equip or arm any vessel for belligerents or assist in any military expedition.

Armed vessels of the nations at war, either public ships or privateers, may not frequent or use American waters under pain of being regarded as unfriendly and offensive. Their warships will not be permitted to use American ports from which the vessel of another belligerent shall have previously departed until 24 hours have expired.

Remember that a special election is to be held here Saturday to vote on amending the City Charter to increase the bonded indebtedness of the city from \$35,000 to \$45,000, the money to be used in improving the municipal water system and for other necessary expenses.

The Tax Commission has decided that all the penalty that can be charged on delinquent taxes is 10 per cent, as shown by the decision of the commission printed in this issue. This will materially reduce the amount of penalty on delinquent taxes.

There has not been as much complaint in this section of shortage of water for irrigation purposes this year as in former seasons. The result of this increased supply of water is seen in the abundant hay crop that is being harvested.

The weather man must have it in for lawn ice cream socials, for every time one of these events are given in Redmond the weather turns off cool in the evening—too cool to enjoy eating ice cream to any appreciable extent.

The Ppblcity Committee of the Redmond Potato Show intend to put out some very attractive advertising for the event this

year. Nothing draws so well as judicious advertising for an exhibition of this kind.

In buying wood this year it would be a good plan to be a little particular and assure yourself that the person selling it has a perfect right to do so—that the wood is not cut off prohibited land. If you buy this kind of wood you are as much liable as the person selling it.

Dropping bombs from airships into towns and cities, thereby killing women and children as well as men, seems to be a barbarous mode of warfare—but that is what some of the armies in Europe are doing now.

Germany will have to buy Oregon hops to make beer with now that all her able bodied men are engaged in war, or else go without beer when the supply of hops now on hand is exhausted.

Those Belgians are evidently some on the fight themselves. Last week the dispatches announced that 25,000 Belgian troops defeated 40,000 Germans, with heavy loss to the latter.

If all telegraphic messages from Europe are so strictly censored how is it accounted for that news of battles and the attendant loss is allowed to be cabled to this country?

The European war has had the effect of raising the price of sugar, lemons, oranges, coffee, paper, and several other commodities in the United States.

A good heavy rain would be much appreciated by citizens of Redmond just now—enough of a rain to lay the heavy dust in the streets.

The European war is liable to put something of a crimp in the 1915 San Francisco Fair.

The whole United States mourns with President Wilson in the death of his wife.

Be sure and cut the weeds around your place. If you don't you are liable to a fine.
