### FULL TEXT OF THE NEW ESTRAY LAW

(Continued from 1st page)

In 20 days thereafter the person taking up said animal shall serve notice upon the unknown owner of such estray by publication in any local newspaper of general circulation in such county, particularly describing the ear marks and brands on the animal taken up, the date of the taking, and any other information that might assist the unknown owner in finding his stock; such notice shall be published once each week for three weeks, and such notice shall also name the year, the month, the day and the hour on which such estray animal will be offered for sale to satisfy damages, costs of keeping and all expenses incurred, including the justice fees and costs of advertising and sale and such other costs or expense as may have been regularly made.

Sec. 5. The nearest constable shall act as auctioneer and the person taking up such animal may bid at such sale, and the proceeds of such sale shall go, first, to pay the expenses of the sale, second, the expenses of the justice of the peace and publication of notice, and third, to pay the expense of keeping such animal, and finally to pay the damages done by such stray animal as assessed by the justice of the peace aforesaid, and the buyer of such animal shall, if the proceedings are regular, obtain a perfect title to such animal. Every item of cost or damage or other expense shall be entered in the docket of the justice of the peace, which docket shall show in detail every step in the proceedings from the date of taking up said animal to the sale thereof, the costs of said sale, selling price and the net proceeds, but nothing herein shall prevent the owner from re-taking such estray if he shall pay to the taker-up all costs, expenses and damages, to that date.

Sec. 6. Any balance remaining after all costs, expenses and damages are paid shall remain in the hands of the justice of the peace as a trustee for the owner, and if such owner shall appear and claim such money within six months thereafter, it shall be paid over to him, taking his receipt therefor, but if six months shall elapse and no owner be found, the justice of the peace shall then pay the same to the county clerk, who shall place the same in the school fund of the county to the credit of the school district in which such animal was taken up, and the county clerk shall enter the record of such proceedings in his estray docket, but such school district shall be liable to the rightful owner of such money for a period of three years. And if such owner shall establish his right to said money the school board shall order the clerk of such district to forthwith issue the school district's warrant to such owner for the full amount of the money received by it from the county clerk for the sale of such animal.

Sec. 7. Any person who shall take up an estray otherwise than according to the provisions of this act, or shall be proven to have not exercised due diligence to ascertain the rightful owner of said estray, shall be deemed guilty of larceny and shall be subject to such penalty as the law provides for such crime.

### Prohibition VS. Temperance

In Germany, where prohibition is unknown and where all the people have been temperate drinkers of wholesome beers and light wines, there is less drunkenness than in Maine or in Kansas—the two most conspicuous prohibition states in the Union.

The same is true of France and Italy. The world over you will find that the really temperate races are those who are not prohibited from drinking temperate beverages such as beer and wine.

Prohibition in Germany, France or Italy would produce exactly the same results that it has produced in every state in the Union where prohibitory laws have been enacted. It would not stop men from drinking nor decrease drunkenness, but it would drive out the mild drinks and encourage men who do drink to resort secretly to the highly concentrated spirits.

If prohibition really saved men from the "curse of drink" it would have more to commend it to the intelligence of the people. But, as the great editor, Henry Watterson, observes in the Louisville Courier-Journal, "It does not promote either temperance or virtue. It arouses human passion to frenzy by restricting private rights. It does not reduce drunkards. It multiplies Pharisees and malefactors."—Paid Advertisement.

losses of water in operating the system is excessive and we fail to see the present necessity for building a \$200,000 dam at Crane Prairie, as proposed. We have made extensive surveys of that valley and have estimated that an adequate dam can be built there, if ever necessary, for \$35,000.

It is probable that the reduction of canal losses will obviate the necessity of any dam at that point so far as the North Canal lands are concerned. It would, of course, be valuable for the reclamation of other lands.

The report is unfair to the company. It does not deny that our costs were correct or necessary, but does not recommend their payment in part, as asked by the company. It does not provide for the relief of the Powell Butte district.

It does not offer sufficient to repay the company for its outstanding liabilities on the North Canal dam and canal so far as constructed, much less to provide any additional funds with which to complete the other parts of the system.

It does not meet the situation of reclamation in Oregon in a broad and fair spirit, and tends toward the further delay of the expenditure of any part of the Reclamation funds rightfully belonging to the state of Oregon, in the hands of the U. S. Reclamation Service.

The report of Mr. Lewis, State Engineer, comes nearer to being fair than does that of the Reclamation engineers, but he does not provide for the relief of the Powell Butte lands.

The company is not asking for anything more than is equitable; it has not denied its willingness to compromise; but as a business proposition cannot accept an offer that would render it impossible to fulfill its obligations both to its creditors and settlers.

### Bend Boy Accidently Shoots Himself in Leg

### Horse Bucks and Automatic Revolver Is Discharged—Lays Helpless for Several Hours Before Found

Bend Bulletin: Fred Gilbert, son of N. G. Gilbert of Bend, was seriously hurt at Crane Prairie the morning of August 17, when his Savage automatic pistol went off twice when his horse began to buck, and one shot entered his left leg about eight inches above the knee, piercing the bone and making a bad fracture. Then the boy dragged himself nearly a mile, and lay there from 10 o'clock in the morning until after 5 in the evening, when O. W. B. Riley heard his calls and rescued him.

When found, says Riley, a small bear had tracked the blood trail up to about 40 yards of Gilbert, and an ugly bull on the other side seemed on the point of goring him. Later, Riley tracked up and killed the bear.

### LOOKING BACK FOUR YEARS AGO IN REDMOND

#### THAT WAS TIME OF RAILROAD CONSTRUCTION HERE

#### Some Items That Will Bring Recollections Back to Those Booming Times

This week F. W. McCaffery sold the Alex Thompson ranch of one section west of Redmond to L. E. Smith for \$16,000. There are 300 acres under cultivation.

Transcontinental railway officials are receiving many inquiries in regard to colonist rates to this section of Central Oregon, and the outlook for a large influx of newcomers into this part of the state is flattering.

Old timers in this section state that this summer has witnessed the longest dry spell in their recollection with the exception of one year. Although the weather has been very warm, none of the crops have suffered to any extent.

One of the productive ranches in the vicinity of Redmond is that of C. R. McLellan. He has had success raising all kinds of fruits, and his garden products find a ready sale in the Redmond market.

C. H. Foster & Son of Powell Butte, arrived this week with the largest threshing outfit that ever came into this part of Central Oregon.

Last Sunday at the B. A. Kendall residence two wedding anniversaries were observed, that of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Buckley who had been married 12 years, and Mr. and Mrs. B. A. Kendall who observed their 9th anniversary.

During the recent automobile war at Shaniko the prices were all shot to pieces, and in some instances a person could get a ride from Shaniko to Redmond or Bend as low as \$3.00.

Musicians are wanted to join the band that is now being organized in the city.

A plan is being worked out for the building of an opera house here by local capital.

000 of which were to be transferred; it was understood that the 35,000 acres would have to share ratably the total cost of \$426,000. This cost sum is not disputed by the engineers and was made, upon request of the examiners, in accordance with the

ideas recommended in the report of the committee appointed by the American Society of Civil Engineers to investigate and report on a plan of valuation of public utilities properties.

Instead of the report being based on these ideas for determining cost, it is based on the narrow view of cost of reproduction of only a part of the work, which is theoretical and does not equal the actual cost of that part not disputed in the report, by \$35,000.

No provision is made in the report for conveying the 114 cubic feet of water to the Powell Butte Canal, one of the most important things for which the North Canal was planned, and which is necessary to relieve the Central Oregon Canal in the irrigation of lands sold in the Powell Butte district.

The report allows the company \$50,000, but if provision is made for the Powell Butte lands at the rate figured by the Reclamation Service, it follows that the company would turn over the work already performed and pay a sum of money in addition.

Among the inconsistencies of the report we call attention to the fact that the estimate of cost allowed to the company for laterals \$4.00 per acre is figured, while for the estimate of completion of like work by the Reclamation Service \$10.00 per acre is allowed.

Attention is also called to the point that in allowing for all overhead charges in the estimate of our cost 10 per cent was allowed, while in the cost for completion by the Reclamation Service 25 per cent was allowed for engineering and contingencies. They may claim that contingent allowance was 15 per cent, but they cut off contingent cost which we actually expended of \$35,000. Furthermore, their allowance of 10 per cent for overhead in cost of completion only included engineering.

It is suggested in the report that North Canal dam may be used for a diversion of a large amount of water for the reclamation of lands in the Madras country; no suggestion is made that in such event those lands bear a proportionate part of the cost of the dam, although such idea is applied to the company in the case of the Pilot Butte Canal and the 2200 acres heretofore sold.

We presented a detailed statement of the costs of the North Canal lands showing \$426,990, which is admitted by the examining engineers to be legitimate.

They claim to have estimated a fair price to be paid to the company for its work in reclaiming the North Canal lands, but have only estimated what the physical work would cost if done under present conditions. They have omitted from their estimate the cost to the company of segregating these lands, and holding them intact; the cost of holding the water rights through its contract with the state, and making a Carey Act project possible. The overhead charges, actual cash outlay and value of these franchises is entirely ignored. Homestead, or desert entries, numerous water filings and other interlocking acts would have so smeared and involved the situation that it would now be very expensive, if not impossible, to reclaim these lands as a whole or any considerable portion of them by a single irrigation system except for the outlay in this respect which the company has made, and therefore a substantial allowance for these expenses should have been added to the cost of reproduction.
