POTATO SHOW OPENS TODAY

Everything All in Readiness for the Fifth Annual Potato Show and Fair

PLenty OF ATTRactions AND Lots Amusements

Large Crowds Are Expected to Attend From All Parts of the County During the Session—Many Exhibits Installed

The Fifth Annual Redmond Potato Show and Fair is on—it opened today for the installation of exhibits Friday and Saturday it will be full swing.

King Murphy will formally open the show tomorrow (Friday) and the whole populace of the county will be present.

This year's exhibition will be the best of agricultural products in central Oregon and will far surpass anything ever before attempted in potato show line.

The exhibits will be placed today, they are much larger and more varied than in any former year. The floor of the Ehret building, 50 feet, will be filled from the floor to the ceiling with the exhibits, arranged in an attractive manner.

CORONATION OF "KING MURPHY" TOMORROW

ROYAL EQUIPAGE WILL BE CENTER OF ATTRACTION

Upon His Arrival in the City He Will Formally Open the Potato Show and Fair

"King Murphy" in his robes of state and seated on his throne, will enter the city from the south end of Sixth street at 12 noon tomorrow, led by the band and escorted by his court.

The ensemble will be imposing and attractive.

The procession will march north to the corner of Sixth and D streets where it will be met by the mayor who, in a short address, will present the king with the keys to the city.

After being presented with the keys to the city, by royal decree, souvenirs will be given to the people attending the ceremonies.

At the conclusion of this ceremony the procession will march to the exhibition hall where "King Murphy" will, in an appropriate address, formally open the Fifth Annual Redmond Potato Show and Fair and turn it over to the managers.

In the procession accompanying "King Murphy" will be the school children from the different grades. The High School will probably have an appropriate float.

During the procession and ceremonies the king will have a body guard composed of the Redmond Spud Club.

EXHIBITS TO LAND SHOW

The exhibits of agricultural products that will be shown at the Potato Show here this week will be taken to the Land Show at Portland that opens there next week, and continues open until Nov. 13. The total exhibit from Redmond, Prineville and Tumalo fairs will probably be the largest and best from any of the counties exhibiting at the show.

WATER APPROPRIATION PERMITS BEEN ISSUED

152 PERMITS TO IRRIGATE 23,143 ACRES OF LAND

Will Require 210 Miles of Canals and Pipe Line—Cost Is Estimated at \$891,242.00

During the quarter ending July 31, 1915, the state engineer issued 152 permits for the appropriation of water under which it is proposed to irrigate 23,143 acres, develop 352 horse power, and construct 15 reservoirs. These permits will require the construction of 210 miles of canals and pipe line, and an estimated expenditure of \$891,242.00.

The following permits were issued in Crook county:

Wm. W. Foster of Paulina, for the irrigation of 28 acres, diverting water from Beaver Creek in Sec. 23, T. 16 S. R. 24 E.

Lillie C. Throop of Paulina, for the irrigation of 7 acres, diverting water from Powell Creek in Sec. 5, T. 16 S. R. 25 E.

Lewis E. Throop of Paulina, for the irrigation of 12 acres, diverting water from Rager Creek in Sec. 4, T. 16 S. R. 25 E.

Edward Mills of Laidlaw, secured a permit to store 180 acre feet of water in Sec. 10, T. 17 S. R. 9 E. for the irrigation of 40 acres of land.

Chas. H. and Della Foster of Terribonne, for the irrigation of 7 acres diverting water from Jap Creek in Sec. 14, T. 14 S. R. 14 E.

Wm. W. Brown of Fife, for the irrigation of 75 acres, diverting water from Twelve Mile Creek and Norcross Creek in Sec. 17, T. 19 S. R. 24 E.

J. Frank Bogue of La Pine, for the irrigation of 40 acres, diverting water from Long Prairie Slough in Sec. 10, T. 22 S. R. 9 E.

Edward Pausch of Fife, for the irrigation of 60 acres, diverting water from McClellan Canyon in Sec. 29, T. 20 S. R. 22 E.

R. R. Brice of Post, for the irrigation of 40 acres, diverting water from North Fork of Crooked River in Sec. 5, T. 17 S. R. 21 E.
