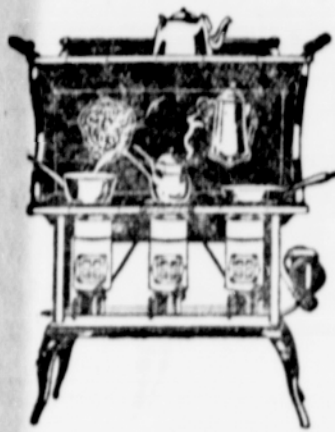

BATTLE TO SAVE CHILDREN BEGUN

New York.—The biggest city in the world was the mobilization center of forces of nation, state and city, waging one of the biggest battles to save life that has ever been fought. New York's 1,600,000 babies were threatened with that mysterious malady, infantile paralysis. Half a dozen other states reported child victims. The federal government started plans to organize a great laboratory here, where it is hoped the nation's greatest bacteriologists may make the sacrifice of the baby victims of the scourge not a vain one—where it is hoped some preventive may be discovered.

The total number of cases in New York city since July 6 has reached about 1000, the total deaths 260.

A large increase in the numbers of deaths and new cases in the epidemic of infantile paralysis was reported.

TO STOP DISEASE SPREAD

Instructions For War on Infantile Paralysis.

Washington.—Instructions for state and city authorities concerning means of preventing spread of infantile paralysis were completed by the public health service to be mailed throughout the United States. It recommends isolation of patients for six or eight weeks and of persons coming in contact with them, and general strengthening of all sanitary precautions.

Reports to the health service indicated that infantile paralysis is not epidemic except in New York City. Elsewhere the number of cases is barely above normal.

Pries Way Out of Jail at Olympia.

Olympia, Wash.—J. F. Gillies, twice convicted of embezzling \$20,000 from state industrial insurance funds while employed as claim agent for the state, Saturday night pried off two flimsy locks with a bolt as a jimmy, and escaped from the Thurston county jail. With him went Henry Roberts, awaiting transfer to the reformatory for a statutory offense.

Mrs. Gillies was arrested, charged with aiding the escape of the prisoners.

Adair's Remains Brought Home.

Portland, Ore.—Six members of the Oregon naval militia and six members of the eighth company coast artillery escorted the body of Lieutenant Henry Rodney Adair, hero of Carrizal, from the train to Holman's funeral parlors when the body arrived here from El Paso, Texas.

Northwest Wheat Short.

Washington.—The department of agriculture estimates that the winter wheat crop of the Pacific northwest this year will fall 23,000,000 bushels below the crop of 1915.

OMNIBUS REVENUE BILL PASSES HOUSE

Measure Providing for New Taxes Gets Vote of 240 to 140.

Washington.—The administration omnibus revenue bill, creating a tariff commission, imposing a protective tariff on dyestuffs, repealing present stamp taxes and providing for new taxes on incomes, inheritances and war munitions profits, passed the house by a vote of 240 to 140.

On the final rollcall the democrats voted solidly for the bill and were joined by 34 republicans, five progressive republicans, one independent and one socialist.

The bill, which now goes to the senate, increases the surtax on incomes ranging from an additional 1 per cent on incomes between \$20,000 and \$40,000 to 10 per cent additional on those above \$500,000 and taxes transfers of estates valued at \$50,000 or more and net profits of war munitions manufactured, with an exemption to those having less than 10 per cent profit. The new taxes are expected to yield \$197,000,000 annually. The tariff commission would be composed of five members, no more than three to be of the same political party, and would have broad powers of investigation.

Representative McArthur of Oregon voted against the passage of the Kitchen revenue bill. Representatives Hawley and Sinnott of Oregon voted for it. The four republican representatives from Washington voted against the bill, as did the two representatives from Idaho. Representative Dill (dem.), of Washington, voted for the bill.

Suggestions From Carranza Awaited.

Diplomatic conversations which it is hoped will result in a settlement of differences between the United States and the de facto government of Mexico, await a suggestion from General Carranza as to how they should proceed. State department officials believe more can be accomplished through informal conferences between Eliseo Arredondo, Mexican ambassador-designate, and Frank L. Polk, acting secretary of state, than by a more formal exchange of views.

Mr. Arredondo transmitted to his government a brief and friendly note handed to him by Secretary Lansing, expressing gratification over the turn affairs between the two governments have taken, and accepting proposals for diplomatic settlement of points in dispute.

Await Report on Russo-Jap Treaty.

Awaiting a full report from Ambassador Guthrie at Tokyo, administration officials maintained absolute silence regarding the new Russo-Japanese treaty and its possible effect upon American interests in the Far East.

It was hoped that this report would define to some extent the meaning of the phrase "Russian and Japanese special interests," whose protection is guaranteed in advance summaries of the treaty text.

This government is interested in knowing whether the new treaty will in any way affect the "open door" through which American bankers might expect to enter China with any legitimate proposals for loans.

Fifty Year Leases for Surplus Power.

The house committee on irrigation of arid lands has favorably reported a bill by Congressman Smith of Idaho authorizing the secretary of the interior to make leases for the period of 50 years for surplus power developed on any of the reclamation projects, giving preference to irrigation districts organized under state law and to municipalities desiring to use such power.

The Smith bill provides that receipts under excess power leases shall be covered into the reclamation fund to the credit of the project where the power is sold.

Guardsmen Having Dependents Freed.

All army departmental commanders have been authorized by Secretary Baker to discharge enlisted men of the national guard in the federal service who have one or more dependent relatives. The order also enjoins department commanders to instruct recruiting officers to avoid acceptance of recruits who have relatives dependent upon them for support.

Road Appeals to Its Men.

San Francisco, Cal.—The Southern Pacific company ordered posted in depots and engine houses throughout its system an appeal to its 52,500 employees to use their influence to avert a threatened strike of engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen.

Governor Johnson to Run for Senator.

San Francisco.—Governor Hiram W. Johnson, of California, entered the primary campaign as a candidate for the United States senate at a meeting here of nearly 1500 progressives, who shouted their acclamation of his candidacy.
