

GRAZING TRESPASS CASE IS BROUGHT TO AN END

TRAILED SHEEP ACROSS CATTLE
RANGE AND DRAWS FINE
OF FIFTY DOLLARS

Barney Parks of Harney, Oregon, indicted for willful grazing trespass upon the Malheur National Forest, pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 by the United States court on June 19. Parks paid his fine and the case is closed.

Parks was in charge of sheep going to their allotted range and instead of following the regularly established driveway, trailed them across the allotted range of other stock owners, consuming four or five days in crossing and using about \$100 worth of forage on the cattlemen's allotment. Instead of holding the sheep owner, who had no part in the action, responsible for the willful feature of the case, the government brought trespass charges against the camp-tender, with the result mentioned above. This is the second case in which an employee has been held responsible for a trespass of this sort in Oregon. It is believed that this court decision, fixing the responsibility upon the man in charge of the stock will stimulate employees to comply with regulations and instructions when handling stock on national forest range.

In the past, when herders or others in charge of stock have refused to observe the regulations and trespass upon range allotted to another stockman, the owner of the stock was held entirely responsible. The government has now adopted the plan of segregating such cases and criminally prosecuting the man in charge of the stock when he acts on his own authority and willfully violates the grazing regulations.

The government undertakes to give grazing permittees quiet possession of the range allotted to them for the use of their stock, and the action in this case was necessary for the protection of the cattlemen whose allotted range was trespassed upon by the sheep.

PLENTY OF LEATHER

(Hide and Leather.)

The impression has gotten into the daily newspapers that there is big shortage of shoes and leather in America. In consequence, for about the first time in history, nearly every daily paper, large and small, in the United States, has been publishing warnings about this alleged shortage, without giving study or serious attention to the matter. It is not surprising, therefore, that much leather, many shoes and considerable leather merchandise of all kinds has been hurriedly purchased and accumulated, as much as possible, by nervous and excited buyers. It can hardly be logically asserted that there is any shortage of shoes and leather in America. For fully nine months our shoe and leather factories, as a rule, have been running at or near full capacity. This meant a tremendous output of shoes and leather. Even allowing for increased exports, we yet seem to be carrying a fairly liberal supply of shoes and leather, although some shortage may appear here and there, for special reasons.

GERMAN SUBMARINE IN AMERICAN PORT

U-Boat Crosses Ocean With
Valuable Cargo of Drugs
and Dyes.

Baltimore.—The world's first sub-
marine merchant vessel, the German
underwater liner Deutschland, anchored
below Baltimore after voyaging
safely across the Atlantic, passing the
allied blockading squadrons and elud-
ing enemy cruisers watching for her
off the American coast.

The new submarine vessel carried a
quantity of mail estimated at 150 tons
and a cargo of 750 tons of costly chem-
icals and dyestuffs and is to carry
back home a similar amount of nickel
and crude rubber sorely needed by the
German army.

The vessel was sixteen days out
from Bremerhaven to Baltimore.

One of Captain Koenig's first acts
after he moved his ship up the harbor
from quarantine was to announce that
the Deutschland was only one of a
fleet of mammoth submarines built
or building for a regular trans-Atlantic
freight and mail service.

The captain asserted that his voy-
age had established the fact that a
submarine of the type of the Deutsch-
land could travel anywhere that the
ordinary vessel could go, 13,000 miles,
if necessary. He had no fears, he said,
of his ability to elude enemies that
might be waiting for him off the Vir-
ginia Capes when he starts his return
trip.

During nearly the entire voyage to
America, said Captain Koenig, the
Deutschland traveled on the surface.
Once she submerged for 10 hours, and
lay during that time on the bottom of
the English Channel to escape British
destroyers.

Allies Ask U. S. to Examine Diver.

Washington.—The British and the
French embassies officially called the
state department's attention to the ar-
rival of the German sugar-submarine
Deutschland, and asked that this gov-
ernment assure itself of the vessel's
character.

FRENCH CARRY HILL OVERLOOKING RIVER

London.—On both eastern and west-
ern fronts heavy fighting persists.
With the capture by the French of La
Maisonnette hill, which dominates the
valley of the Somme, and from which
everything that happens in Peronne
can be observed, one of the primary
objects of the Anglo-French offensive
has been achieved.

The British official statement says
that the Germans have entered the
Trones wood and records further pro-
gress east of Ovillers and La Boisselle
in addition to a footing secured by the
British in the Mametz wood, where
part of the Germans had resisted all
efforts.

The German official communication
admits French possession of Blaches,
only a short distance from Peronne.

The Russians continue their ad-
vance toward Kovle and now are en-
gaged in a pitched battle along the
banks of the Stokhod, which they
have crossed at some points. On the
rest of the eastern front, while there
is continuous fighting at many places,
no important change occurred. Both
sides are concentrating their efforts
on the Lutsk salient to the east of
Kovel.
