ROAD WORK CURTAILED

Highway construction having been placed with river and harbor improvements, the order promulgated and to be made enforceable by a bill now before congress, will likely cut out much or all of the proposed highway improvements in the state of Oregon. Unless of direct aid in winning the war, the proposed road will be classed as a non-essential and if to be built by a bond issue, it will have to wait until peace times, because such bonds will not be O. K.'d, and can not find a market.

In a letter from Chairman Benson of the state highway commission, who had taken up the matter at San Francisco with the chairman of the federal reserve bank, it was stated that the subject had been referred to Washington and that the indications were that the federal officials would not be impressed with the idea that the work on which the money was to be expended was absolutely essential to winning the war.

The highway commission had planned to issue \$500,000 now, and later in the season other issues aggregating \$2,000,000, the full amount allowed to be issued in 1918 by the law. The money was to be spent on the main trunk highways, principally in paving in various counties.

If the bonds cannot be sold, the result will be a heavy curtailment of state road work this year. Counties will receive no allotment for paving and no construction will be undertaken. The funds which will be available will only provide for contracts already under way.

REDMOND'S CAMPAIGN FOR WAR SAVINGS

Deschutes county has been organized for the purpose of securing its quota in the War Savings stamp campaign and much progress is reported in the matter of the sale of Thrift stamps and War Savings certificates. It is incumbent upon Deschutes county to raise seventy-five thousand dollars during the coming year in this branch of the war service, and we have no fear but what our county will more than exceed its share, as has been done with the other war funds than have been collected before this time.

Seven selling stations have been designated in Redmond and it is possible to secure the Thrift stamps at the following places: Lynch & Roberts, Mohler & Doty, W. H. Hobbs, C. H. Irvin, B. A. Kendall, Redmond Bank of Commerce and J. D. Butler. Much rivalry is already manifest among the selling stations, who will report their progress once a week.

The fact that the stamps draw the same interest as the Liberty Bonds and may be purchased in any amount maturing at the beginning of the year 1923 makes the investment very desirable.

INSURANCE FOR MEN ON TORPEDOED TRANSPORT

Any American soldiers lost on the torpedoed transport Tuscania, were protected by the United States government insurance and government compensation. Those who had not applied for insurance were covered by automatic insurance which is payable to a wife, child, or widowed mother. The automatic insurance aggregates about \$4,300, netting \$25 a month for 240 months. Insurance that had been applied for is payable to a much larger class of beneficiaries and can go as high as \$10,000, net-

ting \$57.50 a month for 240 months. The compensation in case of death, given by the government without charge and regardless of rank, or pay ranges from \$20 to \$75 a month, based on the number of dependents. Payments under the compensation feature of the military and naval insurance act in case of death are payable to a widow, children, or dependent widowed mother.

The automatic insurance ceased on February 12, but the compensation feature of the act is a separate provision. The scale of the compensation in case of death follows:

- (a) For a widow alone, \$25.
(b) For a widow and one child \$35.
(c) For a widow and two children, \$47.50, with \$5 for each additional child up to two.
(d) If there be no widow, then for one child, \$20.
(e) For two children, \$30.
(f) For three children, \$40, with \$5 for each additional child up to 2.
(g) For a widowed mother, \$20.

HORSES AND MULES WANTED

Through the county agricultural agents the United States will buy horses and mules. At present cavalry horses weighing from 1000 to 1200 pounds are wanted. They must be from 5 to 10 years old, sound, broken to saddle, 15 hands, and of dark colors. For these \$140 in cash will be paid.

Mules wanted must be 4 years old, broke, and weigh 1200 pounds and up. These will bring \$215 each.

An inspection will be held at Prineville today and here tomorrow, and all animals must be delivered at Redmond.

Enough horses are wanted to supply fifteen regiments of cavalry.

SIR CECIL SPRING-RICE CROSSED THE DIVIDE

After an illness extending over several years, Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, former British ambassador to the United States, died of heart failure at the government house, Ottawa, Canada, last Thursday. He had been in the diplomatic service since 1900 and was 56 years of age.

FARMER STUDENTS MEASURE WATER IN SNOW

The Central Oregon Irrigation school, which opened here Monday with an enrollment of sixty farmers from all over Central Oregon, continues in full swing. The lecturers for the day were John H. Lewis, state engineer; Profs. W. L. Powers and T. A. Teeter of O. A. C., and Fred N. Wallace of the Tumalo project. Tuesday each farmer was taught the correct method of measuring water, and, although the weather was bitterly cold, some fifty farmers built weirs and measured waters in the ditches in the city of Redmond. County Agent Ward with the aid of a fire hose supplied the necessary water for the demonstrations. Tuesday night the School met in the Redmond High school and were given a lecture and shown one hundred and twenty stereopticon slides of U. S. Reclama-
