EVERYTHING GOING OUT, NOTHING COMING IN

Communities are beginning to complain that on account of the inequality of the distribution of war expenditures they are being slowly but persistently forced into community bankruptcy and are in danger of being branded as slackers through their inability to meet their apportionment of war subscriptions, as is shown by the following paragraph from a letter from a prominent banker of Southern Oregon to R. N. Stanfield:

"I am especially pleased with your vigorous statement in regard to getting more of the government money spent in Oregon for supplies. In this part of the state we are especially hard hit because we have very little to sell, and have subscribed very liberally to all war activities as well as the rest of the state. The money has been sent out for the subscriptions, and unless some of it comes back, we will in the near future be unable to fill our quotas and be branded as slackers. Our one principal industry the growing of fruit, has been injured rather than benefited by the war. We have timber resources here, but thus far there has not been much encouragement locally for developing this."

NON-LAYING HENS MAY BE MARKETED

W. K. Newell, assistant federal food administrator for Oregon, has telegraphed from Washington, where he has been in attendance at a conference of state administrators, that the ban on non-laying hens had been lifted under the following provision:

"That the grower, in making shipment, must attach a certificate with each lot that they are non-layers. The buyer shall then forward the certificate to this office."

He also advised that, on account of the season being a month earlier on this coast than in the east, all restrictions on the sale of hens probably will be removed on April 1 in California, Oregon and Washington, instead of April 30 as originally ordered.
