"The company was looking at multiple locations both in and out of state, and selected Redmond due to land availability, staff responsiveness, access to the Long-Term Rural Enterprise Zone program, and the quality-of-life Central Oregon has to offer."

As part of the recruitment, Wild Mike's is seeking a 15year tax exemption on the value of the improvements (taxes on the land are not exempted). To receive a 15-year exemption, eligible projects must create a minimum of 50 jobs within 3 years of occupancy, at a compensation of 150% of County Average and invest at least \$12.5 million dollars — which this project exceeds.

The Enterprise Zone program is a locally sponsored, State statutorily governed program that has been in existence in Redmond since 1988. However, this is the first project eligible to receive the Long Term Rural 15-year tax abatement.

"The city's job incentive program will help us realize our ambition of becoming one of America's largest pizza manufacturers, without having to the leave the state where my family was born and raised," saod Wild Mike's Ultimate Pizza President and CEO Steve Piazza.

"We are excited to build this dream in Redmond, Oregon and hire hundreds of new associates to join our team."

Recognizing the length of this exemption, Wild Mikes has agreed to pay an annual community investment fee equal to \$618 per full-time equivalent jobs adjusted annually starting Jan. 1, 2022.

The CIF is expected to generate approximately \$70,000

per year.

City staff are recommending to City Council the CIF be directed towards public safety. Keeping public safety services (officers per thousand) at pace with population growth has been an identified goal for City Council and staff for many years. With the estimated cost to the General Fund for each new officer at around \$144,000 (salary, benefits, equipment), the ability to offset this through the CIF would free up an equal amount of General Fund dollars for other eligible services and investments.

The Long-Term Rural Enterprise Zone agreement for Wild Mike's will be presented to Redmond City Council for approval on March 16. Following council approve, it then needs to be approved by the Deschutes Board of County Commissioners and the City of Sisters (who are also co-sponsors of the zone).

## Park

Quartz Park will serve a part of south-central Redmond that doesn't have a community park nearby. The closest city parks — Hayden Park and Baker City Park — are about a mile and a half-mile away. And both are much smaller.

"The south (end of Redmond) has grown pretty dramatically, and that is one area we could definitely use more parks," McVay said.

Mayor George Endicott agreed that Quartz Park will be in a great location. He noted that there are multiple apartment complexes that will soon be built nearby, including a massive development off SW Canal Boulevard about a half-mile away.

"We try to build (a park)" within a half-mile of every home," Endicott told The Bulletin on March 3. "In this case, with all those new projects ... you're looking at 300-400 homes who could access it."

However, at the March 2 Redmond City Council meeting, some city councilors expressed concern that adding funding for an expanded Quartz Park could take funding away from other, future park projects.

"Rather than just saying, 'just go ahead,' I'd like to see what it would affect if we do it," councilor Jay Patrick said at the meeting. The council decided to have McVay look into this and report back later.

On March 3, McVay told The Bulletin that the parks department has enough funds to pay for an expanded Ouartz Park, and paying more for it wouldn't hurt any future projects.

At the meeting, some councilors also expressed concern about traffic safety nearby.

The master plan shows a second, smaller portion of the park south of Quartz Avenue,

extend Quartz all the way across U.S. Highway 97 to the airport, Endicott and councilor Ed Fitch pointed out at the meeting. Crossing the street and interrupting traffic flow could be a concern, they said.

McVay said the park will have a crosswalk across Quartz Avenue, likely with flashing beacon lights. And at the meeting, City Engineer Mike Caccavano said the extension of Quartz Avenue likely won't make the street much busier at the future park's location.

"It's all surrounded by neighborhood, so putting a park here wouldn't impact its function as a collector," Caccavano said March 2.

City councilor Clifford Evelvn told The Bulletin that he needs more information about Quartz Park before he fully supports it. However, he likes the proposed new amenities.

> "I think a parking lot for the park is important, and a restroom that actually flushes," Evelyn said March 3. "We're in modern times, we shouldn't have port-a-potties lying around."

If the park is built as planned, construction will start this sum-

mer and hopefully finish by late fall, McVay said. If the city council tells the

parks department to scale down Quartz Park to save funding, there would be a delav due to restarting the planning process, she said. That means construction likely wouldn't start until 2022.


