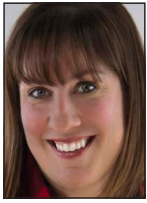
COVID-19 vaccine clinics set for Redmond-area high schools

After more than a year of mostly distance learning, missed events and lots of uncertainty, school is starting to feel like it's getting back to normal.

In an effort to continue that push to return to normal, the Redmond School District has partnered with area hospitals and health departments, as well as regional school districts, to provide an opportunity for students 16 and older to receive COVID-19 vaccines. Medical professionals will administer the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine to eligible students who register for this voluntary opportunity.

Mosaic Pediatrics will be on hand at Redmond and Ridgeview high schools in early May to administer first shots to interested and eligible students. They'll return at the end

of the month to administer second shots.

The vaccine is not required for students to attend school. Participation in the vaccine clinics is voluntary.

We know not everyone is on board with this vaccine, but it's important to make sure those students who want a vaccine can get one without barriers. Holding the vaccine clinics in our school gyms allows students access — and their opportunity to help end a global pandemic.

It was also important to the region's school districts to finish these vaccine clinics before the end of the school year, because we know in the summer it's likely our students will be spending time together, and this will help prevent the spread of the virus.

An added bonus: fully vaccinated students without COVID-19 symptoms will not have to quarantine if

exposed to the virus, giving them the ability to remain in classes, athletics and activities if they are not symptomatic. They've already missed out on a lot, and we want them to be able to participate as fully as possible going forward.

In Oregon, kids 15 and older can make their own decisions regarding medical treatment without their parents' consent — and that includes vaccinations. That said, we know it's a big decision for some families, so we hope parents will take the time to sit down with their students who are eligible and come to an agreement together.

- 5/7 8 a.m. — 5 p.m. Redmond High School (First Dose)
- 5/11 8 a.m. — 5 p.m. Ridgeview High School (First Dose)
- 5/26 8 a.m. — 5 p.m. Redmond High School (Second Dose)
- 6/1 8 a.m. — 5 p.m. Ridgeview High School (Second Dose)

Suspect sought in connection with Motel 6 altercation

Redmond police are seeking one of two suspects tied to an assault at a Motel 6 last Friday. One suspect, Damon Hall, was arrested in Prineville. Police are seeking a Levi Hall.

Hall faces charges of robbery, burglary and assault, unlawful use of a weapon, coercion, menacing and theft II. He remains in jail in lieu of \$215,000 bond.

On Friday at 7 a.m., police were called to the Motel 6 after a report was called in of a person screaming. Officers found Tamar Dibben, 21, of Redmond, with an injury to his right hand and a cut to his head. Dibben was taken to St. Charles Redmond where he was treated for non-life-threatening injuries.

Police identified Levi Hall, 27, and Damon Hall, 22, both of Prineville, as suspects in the case. Hall is 5-11, 165 pounds, with blond hair and blue eyes.

Redmond man accused of homicide faces new charges

A Redmond man charged with criminally negligent homicide pleaded not guilty Friday in Jefferson County Circuit Court, and was released from custody after posting bail.

Honorio Huerta-Vasquez, 31, has been charged in the death of Edgar Morales, 30.

Following the hearing, he paid 10% of his \$150,000 bond and was released from the Jefferson County jail.

Huerta-Vasquez's indictment and other documents in the case are sealed on a judge's order, but Jefferson County District Attorney Steve LeRiche has said Morales was discovered dead with a bullet wound next to his truck at the Skull Hollow Campground outside Terrebonne on Sunday.

Huerta-Vasquez was charged in a new indictment Thursday. He faces two additional charges: negligent wounding of another and tampering with physical evidence, both misdemeanors.
