That can make ordering curriculum tricky for elementary leaders - most elementary curriculum covers K-5 — and fifth grade teachers, who are at the middle

school, Scholl said. "All the curriculum we buy is K-5, so it just makes sense to build a K-5," he said.

Even with one fewer grade, Sisters Elementary is stuffed. The school expects to need portable classrooms next school year, and small groups taken out of the classroom for breakout sessions are forced onto the stage, in hallways and even closets, Principal Joan Warburg told The Bulletin in February.

If voters don't pass the bond, class sizes at Sisters Elementary School will simply have to balloon, said Scholl. And small class sizes increase student achievement, particularly in grades K-2, he said.

"If we don't have the classroom space, the only way you can serve the kids is adding more kids to each classroom," Scholl said.

School officials say a new building is simply needed for a city where new families keep arriving. Sisters' population grew

by nearly 35% between 2010 and 2018, from 2,038 people to 2,747, according to the U.S. Census Bureau estimates. It's a growth rate comparable to Bend.

The new elementary would also be built next door to Sisters high and middle schools, Scholl said. This makes it easier

for the district to consolidate resources, and helps education specialists who work with students of all grades, he said.

If voters approve the bond, Scholl hopes the new elementary school will welcome its first students by September 2023.

Former property manager gets time in jail for embezzling \$13K in rent checks

A former Redmond property manager was convicted of stealing more than \$13,000 in tenant rent money.

Shonny Shury Vernon was sentenced last week in **Deschutes County** Circuit Court to seven days in jail after pleading guilty to one count of aggravated first-degree theft.

Vernon, 50, was formerly employed by Cascade Property Management as a property manager for the Bluffs Apartments complex in Redmond, according to court documents.

In May 2018, a number of residents of the complex were shown to be behind on their rent. Nearly all of them were able to provide receipts showing they had in fact paid their rent.

The management company audited Vernon's work and found thousands of dollars missing.

Police discovered many of these payments were cash, and many were MoneyGrams that had been altered to be paid to Vernon instead of the Bluffs Apartments, according

to court documents.

Vernon was found to have stolen more than \$13,000 from tenant rental payments. An additional \$300 in petty cash was also missing.

In addition to jail, **Deschutes County** Circuit Court Judge Wells Ashby ordered that Vernon serve two years probation and pay full restitution to Cascade

Property Management and First Financial Asset Management. Vernon's attorney, Mi-

chelle McIver, said her client's crimes were not drug related and that she stole to feed a gambling addiction. "Ms. Vernon is quite re-

morseful," McIver said. "She has been quite forthright in how she came to take advantage of an employer that was always good to her." Following her arrest, Ver-

non found other employment and has not hidden her crime, McIver said. She's to have nothing to do with money in her current role.

"Ms. Vernon understands that all this is very generous of her present employer," McIver said.


