Growth of Mutual Savings Banks.

The mutual savings banks of New England are beginning to find favor in the west, which is good news for those who have a little to save and wish to be reasonably sure of its security. If the western projectors of such institutions strictly follow the New England model they can sleep easy o' night. Conservatively managed, with rent and clerk hire as their only expense, they give to their depositors nearly all of their earnings, and if managed strictly in accordance with law they cannot fail while the government lasts.

A few such provident institutions are in successful operation in Wisconsin. one of them, the Beloit Savings bank, which was cradled in a justice's office in 1882, having now \$869,936 to the credit of its 4,300 depositors. Knowledge of the success of these banks has spread throughout the state and the demand by farmers and wage earners for their multiplication led recently to thought for the sensibilities of passers. a revision of the laws simplifying the organization of such institutions. Because of their trustworthiness and their mutual features they are likely in due be well if an occasional prosecution season to almost wholly, if not entirely. supersede the private savings banks.

Profanity In Public.

It is to be hoped that the recent in cident at Oyster Bay, in which a bicyclist was taken to task for using profanity because his way was momentarily blocked by the carriage of President Roosevelt on the way to church, will have the effect of lessening the prevalence of the disgusting and utterly useless habit of using profane and vulgar language in public places. In ordering the removal of the offender against common decency the president's action was no more than it should have been. It would have been gratifying had the time and the circumstances permitted an immediate drastic punishment of the boor by primitive methods. Doubtless had the tent of wrecking their institution offending bicyclist known of the proximity of the president's carriage he would have been more discreet, but that made no difference in the degree of his misconduct. Men indulge in the grossest forms of expression without and seldom do creatures of this ilk think to lower their voices in the presence of women and children. It would served the excellent purpose of emphasizing the fact that society holds to cer-

tain conventions as to speech which cannot be lightly disregarded.
