**STAYTON, OREGON**

Is located on the Santiam river, in the foothills of the Cascade range, and in the far-famed Willamette valley. It is 18 miles southeast of Salem, the state capital. The town proper has a population of about 700, though as only about half live within the incorporation, the 1900 census gives the place only 324. It has good school and church buildings, good business buildings and many handsome residences. The soil is rich, the water the best and as soft as rainwater. The climate is fine, and there are excellent openings for all.

Stayton now has two flour mills, saw mill, planing mill, sash and door factory, chair factory, carding and knitting mill, electric light plant, water works, city hall, fire engine and company, four general stores, one drug store, two grocery stores, two hardware stores, jewelry store, shoe store, furniture store, millinery store, meat market, livery stable, feed stable, barber shop, tailor shop, harness shop, cabinet shop, paint shop, two blacksmith shops, wagon shop, newspaper and job printing office, bank, A. F. & A. M. and I. O. O. F. lodges, several insurance organizations Methodist, Baptist, Christian, and Catholic churches, four-room public school, opera house, hotel, three saloons, photograph gallery, three physicians, dentist, veterinary, attorney, undertaker and embalmer, cheese factory, etc.

The town has one of the best water-powers in the state, on which any number of factories may be located.
