Woolen Mill Proposition Pro-
gressing Satisfactorily.

\$65,000 Already Subscribed—Buildings
Will Be Commenced as Soon as \$75,-
000 Is Taken.

There is still \$10,000 stock to sell,
and the woolen mill for Stayton is as-
sured. Every enterprising business
man and property holder in Stayton
has taken stock in the mill. The bal-
ance of the stock is being offered to
the people of the surrounding country
and those who have already been so-
licited are taking an interest in the
proposition.

Regardless of the benefits that will
accrue to the town and country, as an
investment there is nothing better in
the state. The managers are satisfied
the mill will pay fully 20 per cent one
year with another, put under any con-
ditions guarantee six per cent on the
investment after the first year.

Below we give the cost of handling
Willamette valley wool under present
conditions:
Local wool buyer..... 5c per lb
Freight to Portland..... 1c per lb
Profit to Portland buyer..... 2c per lb
Freight on wool to Boston (wool ship-
ped in grease, paying freight on
one pound dirt)..... 2c per lb
Boston wool buyer's profit..... 2c per lb
Freight on wool from Boston to wool-
en mills..... 5c per lb
7c

The wool is then made into cloth by
eastern woolen mills and shipped to
commission houses, who sell the cloth
to the clothing houses to be manufac-
tured into clothing. It costs the east-
ern woolen mills 20 per cent to sell
the cloth, in discounts, freights and
commissions, and the clothing houses
figure on 10 per cent for the cost of
selling the clothing. In addition to
this we have to add the freight on
clothing being returned to the Pacific
Coast, making a total expense of 40
per cent for handling the wool to the
finished product.

To cut out this expense of handling,
a clothing factory will be operated in
connection with the mill, so as to take
the wool direct from the sheep's back
and manufacture it into the finished
garment ready for the wearer, and not
figuring a cent profit on the finished
product the mill makes a saving of 30
per cent that is now being paid in
freights and cost of handling. Woolen
mills are paying on an average of
20 per cent dividends and the saving
effected by making up the finished
garment of 30 per cent under these
conditions would amount to 50 per
cent. We feel safe in saying that every
member can depend on 20 per cent.

The woolen mill and clothing factory
combined will employ 100 hands
with a pay roll of \$4000 a month. This
means an increase in population to
our town of at least 500 people, in-
creasing real estate values both in
town and surrounding country. Let
everybody do all they can and we will
let outsiders know before long that

Stayton is on the map. With our wa-
ter power, cheap fuel, and other facili-
ties, we can make Stayton the best
factory town in the State.
