The Word "Blackmailing."

The word "blackmailing," derived from the Anglo-Saxon "mal" (tax) and the old French "malle" (a coin of small value), was originally applied to rents paid in kind, in order to distinguish them from payments made in silver or "white" payments. About the sixteenth century it was applied to money paid as the price of protection from freebooters. This was declared illegal by Elizabeth, but flourished in the highlands of Scotland until after Culloden, in 1745.

"Blackmail" is mentioned in Archbishop Hamilton's Catechisme (1552). One of the most picturesque leviers of blackmail was Rob Roy, who grew famous in this connection about the year 1730. In its modern use blackmail is the extortion of money by threat of public exposure.
