Good Roads Meeting.

There was an enthusiastic and well attended meeting of tax-payers from Sublimity, Aumsville, Mehama and Stayton precincts, at the Stayton opera house Saturday afternoon. The meeting was called to accept the proposition made by the county court that the court would furnish a rock crusher for use in these precincts if the people would agree to perform a certain amount of free work on the roads. Sublimity came in with about \$1500 to her credit, Stayton had about the same, and the other precincts were well represented. The necessary amount to secure the crusher was raised and the machine is expected here soon.

Hon. John H. Scott and J. H. Albert were present and addressed the meeting. Judge Scott offered a proposition that was favorably considered by some, but a majority seemed to think it one that it would be unwise for this section to attempt at present. It was to the effect that if the people between Stayton and Salem would undertake to build a first-class road between the two places, the court would help them to the amount of \$500 per mile. Stayton and Sublimity people, as well as those of adjoining precincts, are thoroughly alive to the necessity of good roads, but at present do not care to attempt any work other than that demanded right at home. The court's proposition was considered a fair one, but one not to be thought of until the necessary work about home is finished.
