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
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Broom Dampener.

Instead of sprinkling the floor before sweeping (to prevent dust arising), a Wisconsin man has devised an attach-



ment for brooms head of the broom. Depending from the reservoir are

discharge nozzles which are inclined and embedded in the fibres of the broom. The contents but is only dampened; when not being used, the broom is placed with handle down, so that the contents of the reservoir will not discharge.

Pineapple Vinegar.

When putting up pineapples save all the parings, with any bits of fruit or strup left over. Place in crocks and cover with water, adding sugar or syrup to make a pleasant acid. Cover, set in the sun and allow the mixture to ferment. Watch and skim as needed. When the fermentation has been accomplished, strain from the fruit and bottle. This vinegar is delightful in color and flavor.

Head Cheese.

Boil the head, ears and tongue of the plg in salted water until very tender, strip the meat from the bones and chop fine. Season with salt, pepper, sage, sweet marjoram, a dash of cloves and a half-cup of strong vinegar. Mix well and pack in molds. Press down and put a weight on top of the meat. Do not use under two days. Serve cold and slice thin.

Very Nice Cookies.

One cupful of butter, two cupfuls sugar, four eggs, juice of half lemon, grated peel of one lemon, one teaspoonful of cream tartar, one-half teaspoonful of soda, five cupfuls of flour. Save the white of one egg, beat to a stiff froth and spread upon the top of the cookies and then sprinkle with sugar. Teaspoonfuls in this rule are even full and not heaped.

Cream one-fourth cupful of butter, add gradually nearly three-fourths of a cupful of cold boiled ham, chopped fine, also a well beaten egg; then alternately one cupful of graham flour and one cupful of white flour, sifted, with three tespoonfuls of baking powder and a cupful of milk. Bake in a hot, wellbuttered muffin pan about twenty-five

Maine Crumpets.

One-half cupful sugar, two-thirds cupful shortening mixed together. Add one-half cupful molasses, one teaspoonful each cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger and salt, one-half cupful sour milk with one teaspoonful soda dissolved in it. Flour to make the consistency of cookies. Roll about one-half inch thick. Bake in quick oven.

Boiled Lamb and Mutton.

Cut the outside skins from pieces of mutton or lamb, wash well, and cover with water, adding two or three bay leaves, a pinch of thyme and pepper to taste. Simmer until the meat is nearly done, then season with salt, and, if it is liked, add rice. Boil until the rice is tender, then serve.

Current and Raspberry Jam.

Wash and stem ripe currants and mix with an equal quantity of red raspberries. Weigh them and take a pound and a half of sugar to three pounds of fruit; crush and cook for fifteen minutes while the sugar heats in the oven. Cook half an hour more with sugar.

How to Bake Peaches.

Peaches may be baked like apples with excellent results. Peel the fruit, put into a baking dish with sugar, bits of butter and a cupful of water. Bake until the peaches are tender. A few chopped nuts sprinkled over the top of the fruit is an improvement. They should be served cold.

Canned Beets.

Cook and peel as for immediate use, elice and pack into glass jars. Boil good vinegar and add to a quart of it a tablespoonful of sugar and salt and pepper to taste. While boiling, fill the beet jars to overflowing, and seal immediately. Keep in a dark place.

Asbestos in the Kitchen.

Keep a supply of asbestos paper in your kitchen. If the oven is too hot and the cake likely to burn at the top, put a sheet of the paper on the grate over the tin. If there is danger of burning at the bottom, put a sheet under the tin.

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
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
