By the middle of the summer they expect to cut down the running time between the capital and the metropolis to an hour and forty-five minutes. Trains from both Portland and Salem leave at 8 o'clock a. m., and 2 o'clock p. m., and arrive at 11 o'clock and 5 o'clock.

August Johnson, in the county jail charged with burglary at the home of Willim Follis, near Kingston, is getting tired of confinement. Today Sheriff Smith caught him with the handle of a spoon in the key hole, trying to make an impression which would enable him to file notches in the handle in some way for a key. He had broken off the bowl. The end fitted so close it stuck and the Sheriff secured it while in the hole, a complete giveaway. He will not be trusted with many corridor privileges hereafter.—Albany Democrat.

The county commissioners have created a new voting district by taking a part of the Horeb district and adding to it a part of the Mehama district, creating the Mill City precinct with Mill City as the voting place. The new precinct was made in accordance to a petition of a large number of the concerned and interested residents. Acting in accordance with another petition the commissioners' court cut off a part of road district No. 11, known as the Scotts Mills district and added it to district No. 12, some times called the Crooked Finger district.—Statesman.

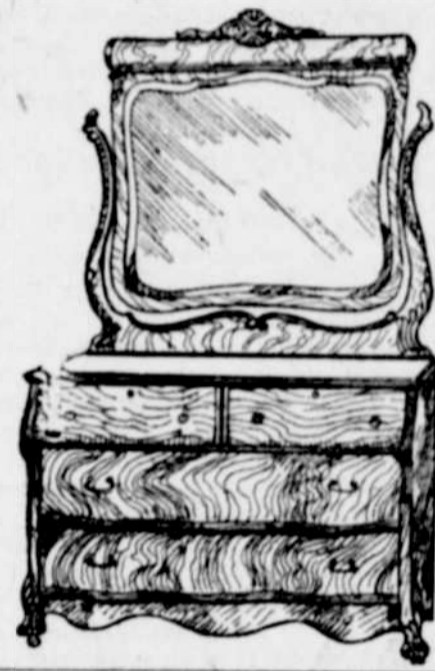
