To the Citizens of the Town of Stayton.

In as much as there are certain ordinances, the enforcement of which would tend to the betterment of our town, but have been very laxly enforced or overlooked entirely, we, the officers of the Town of Stayton, with your aid, assistance and co-operation, hereafter expect, to the best of our ability, to enforce all laws of record and in force in town.

For the benefit of those whom it may concern, we would like to merely mention the fact that we have laws requiring minors under the age of eighteen years to be off the streets after nine o'clock p. m.; making it unlawful for minors under the age of eighteen years to frequent billiard halls; requiring billiard balls to close at ten o'clock p. m., and to remain closed on Sunday; and other laws, such as the Sunday closing of saloons, repairing sidewalks, etc.

However, in case the enforcement of any law works an injustice or a hardship, the council, upon proper complaint, are ready and willing to make any amendment to any such law or laws as they deem just and equitable and for the best interests of the people at large.

POST CARD RATES OF POSTAGE.

The following rates of postage on Post-cards should be known to all people. Post-cards mailed in sealed envelopes, transparent or otherwise, must bear a two-cent stamp. If wholly or partly in writing and in unsealed envelopes, two cents. If entirely in print, one cent, and the postage must be placed on the envelope—not on the card. The government does not recognize postage placed on post-cards in envelopes with an opening in the same. Post-cards bearing "flitter" or gilt are unavailable except in envelopes.
