COMMERCIAL CLUB.

The regular meeting of the Club was held Friday evening, the 21st. There was a good attendance and a spirit of enthusiasm manifested.

The railroad question was discussed, and the general opinion was that, aside from the present need of transportation, if Stayton gets her proportion of the immigration to Oregon, a railroad is necessary, and it was decided that the railroad committee be continued, and given power to interview railroad owners and builders. They were also instructed to investigate further as to the amount of stock that can be secured toward building a road.

The cannery question was discussed, and the committee given further time to investigate the cost of the same.

The committee on laundry reported that a gentleman from Albany had been here looking over the ground, and if a suitable building can be secured, will locate here. Arrangements can probably be made to secure this needed industry.

RUSH FOR REALTY.

Tuesday and Wednesday there was a grand rush for town lots in the Leutich addition. For some time Mr. Leutich has refused to put a price on the lots in his addition to Stayton, which are located west of G. L. and C. E. Brown's. However, the first of the week he placed the lots on the market through his agent, J. T. Kearns, and in two days Mr. Kearns sold thirty-five lots.

This part of town is an excellent residence location, and we expect to see several new houses go up there before the year ends.

RACE TRACK.

The committee that has been soliciting funds for the building of a race track has secured over \$300. The track will probably be built on the place of W. L. Freres, in the north-west part of town.

At a meeting held Saturday night a temporary organization was perfected, Dr. Beauchamp, chairman, and F. F. Foster, Secretary. A committee was appointed to draft constitution and by-laws.

Sufficient funds have been secured to make the affair a success, and the intention is later to incorporate with the race meetings a display of stock and farm produce, and make a district fair.

HORSE SHOW.

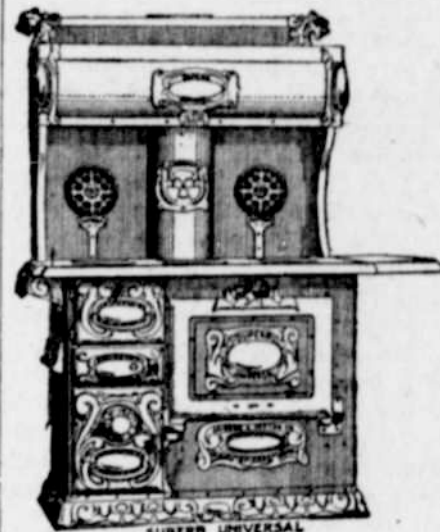
