Orghardists predict the largest crop in the history for 1908 in the Rogue river valley. The fruit buds already indicate an immense harvest, far larger than last season's unless some unforeseen event, such as a late frost, cuts down the yield.

Eastern people are already beginning to arrive on the Spring colonist rates. The disposition is to seek the smaller towns and the majority of those looking for country place intend to enter fruit growing or dairying, two industries especially attractive in Washington and Oregon, where they bring greater returns than in any other part of the country.

The Schwarzschild and Sulzberger Packing Company is asking permission of the city of Portland to cover fourteen acres in the suburbs with a plant which will represent an outlay of \$1,500,000. Coming immediately after the definite announcement of the \$4,000,000 establishment which Swift and Company are to build during 1908, Oregon stockmen are jubilant over the recognition accorded this section of the United States as a packing center.

No section of the Union surpasses the Pacific Northwest in the excellence of its public schools, and Oregon communities are manifesting their interest in the State University by urging upon the State the most liberal appropriations for the maintenance of this institution in a way that will enable it to reach its highest efficiency. This was the meat of a resolution adopted by the Portland Com. Club recently. Public bodies throughout the Northwest appreciate that institutions of higher learning are a factor of the greatest importance to Eastern people who contemplate making their homes here.

Fruit, dairying and other industries of Oregon have all been given their share of publicity, but poultry raising is rarely mentioned outside of the publications which are either devoted to poultry or have a special department for it. \$5,000,000 annually is a very conservative estimate of the returns from this industry to Oregon farmers, and yet thousands of cases of eggs are shipped in every year from the Middle West to supply the demand here. Expert poultry raisers say that the climate of Western Oregon in particular is conducive to very rapid and healthful growth. There is one community alone in Southern Oregon that annually markets between \$40,000 and \$50,000 worth of turkeys.

The Republican county convention at Salem last Saturday resulted in considerable discussion over Statement No. 1. It seems that the old ring politicians were determined to down Statement No. 1 but only succeeded in so far as to get a resolution passed declaring that "all candidates for the Legislature on the Republican ticket subscribe to a statement that they will support for United States senator that candidate elected by the votes of the Republican party." When a voter becomes satisfied that he hasn't sense enough to vote for his choice for United States senator, but must have some one do it for him, then he should declare against Statement No. 1, but not before. The ringsters are against Statement No. 1 as it removes the opportunity for graft in the legislature.

A good story is going the rounds about a pair of local newlyweds. One night recently, so the story goes, he was awakened by the sobbing of his wife and inquiry as to the cause, between sobs, she told him that she had an awful dream. Naturally, hubby wanted to know all about the dream but she simply could not tell him and burst into a renewed flow of tears. This looked serious and the gentleman of the house insisted on knowing all. She agreed to tell all provided he would not get angry. This he readily consented to and she began.
