Ex President Grover Cleveland died at his home at Princeton, N. J., Wednesday morning, aged 71 years, having been born in New Jersey March 18, 1837. He was president of the U. S. 1884-1888 and 1892-1896. He was the only living ex-president.

Notice to Growers.

Your attention is called to the law of this state enacted in 1907 relating to the marking of fruit boxes. Under the provision of this law every person, firm, association or corporation engaged in growing, packing or selling green fruits in Oregon is required to mark, stamp or label plainly on the outside of every box or package when packed the name and address of the packer, and if the packer is not the grower, the name and address of the grower as well as of the packer must appear prominently upon the box or package. It is made unlawful for any merchant, shipper or vender to represent that any green fruits were raised, produced or grown by any other person than the one who actually raised them, or that they were raised or grown in any other place or locality than that in which they were actually grown. Any violation of this law is punishable by fine or imprisonment or both and the possession for the purpose of sale of any falsely or illegally marked box or package is made prima facie evidence that the person having such illegally marked box or package is the violator of the law.

All persons are warned to conform with the provisions of this law.

Brown, guardian of the minor wards above named and presents to this court her duly verified petition praying for an order and license of this court authorizing and empowering her to sell all the right, title and interest of each of said above named minors in and to the following described real premises, to-wit:

TRACT NO. 1
All of Block No. Six (6) in Hollister's addition to the Town of Stayton, Marion county, Oregon, as shown by the plat thereof.

TRACT NO. 2
Commencing at a point 135 feet west and 60 feet south of the northwest corner of Water and Third Streets in the Town of Stayton, Marion County, Oregon, thence south 40 feet; thence west 25 feet; thence north 30 feet; thence east 25 feet to the place of beginning, the same being part of Lot, No. 2 of the Hammer survey of the said Town of Stayton as shown by the recorded plat thereof.
