\$10,000 LIMIT OF CONTRIBUTION

Democrats Won't Accept More From One Person.

Lincoln, Neb., July 15.—The appointment of a subcommittee to meet at the Auditorium Annex in Chicago on July 25 to name a chairman of the Democratic National Committee and the adoption of a resolution providing for making public campaign contributions, were the principal accomplishments of the National committee meeting with W. J. Bryan and J. W. Kern at Fairview yesterday. Mr. Bryan and Mr. Kern recommended the following:

"We suggest for your approval a maximum of \$10,000 and a minimum of \$100, no contribution to be received above \$10,000, and all contributions above \$100 to be made public before election.

"We suggest also that on or before October 15, publication shall be made of all contributions above \$100 received up to that date; that after October 15 publication shall be made of such contributions on the day that the same are received and that no contribution above \$100 shall be accepted within three days of the election."
