The Cherry Fair and Carnival in Salem is now a matter of history. It is a fact which not only Marion County but the Beaver state as well can give to the world that the Cherry Fair was the greatest exhibit of cherries ever shown in any state or country. One need not but gaze upon the many varieties and then wonder if they were real or artificial. We know some people thought those cherries were made for show but Marion county never does things that way.

Every cherry and fruit on display was a native product and to those who are of the opinion that they have better at home should have gone to the Cherry Fair and Carnival gazed upon the marvelous exhibits, then decided to forever be a resident of Marion county; the south eastern section in particular.

Fruit lands here yield as well as Hood River without irrigation. Why go to Hood River, Rogue River, or to any other place, when as fine land for all purposes can be had from \$60 up per acre where the climate is perfect, no frosts, no irrigation and where roses bloom twelve months in the year. Please bear this fact in mind, that Stayton is the center of the district from which every branch of agriculture is a paying proposition. Fruits, grains and grasses, stock of all breeds and classes, thrive for the masses in Marion county.

**Wood And Milk Would Build Road.**

As a matter of interest one of the influential farmers of Aumsville was making a comparison recently that is truly worthy of note. He has from reliable sources ascertained that over fifty thousand cords of wood go to Salem from out side points annually.

This wood must be hauled by team many miles where but one trip can be made daily to a shipping point. Some sections are more favorably located than others but be that as it may Stayton and vicinity can furnish thousands of cords of either cord or slab wood and would do so if railroad facilities were here.

In addition this section of Marion county is especially adapted to dairying even now milk and cream products are sent out by express in quantities large enough to bring a revenue which with the wood sold in Salem would build and equip the eighteen miles of road from Stayton to Salem in three years under present conditions but we will not have long to wait. Stayton is to have an electric line with the financial assistance of Marion county capital.

If wood and milk will build the road in three years the freight brought to Stayton annually would be a great item on the right side of a balance sheet. Let us hope to hear the whistle of the car before the close of 1908. It can be accomplished.

**Ice Plant Improved.**

The ice factory which is run in connection with the meat market by Jos. Sestak has been materially improved by the replacement of a gasoline engine with a steam engine, but still greater improvements are yet to be made.

Mr. Sestak informs us that he will install a larger compressor so that in the near future he will be able to supply all ice demands in this section.
